One-off project grant funding could be provided to a peak organisation in 2017-18 to update its clinical/professional guidelines through the Health Peak and Advisory Bodies (HPAB) Programme, noting that the program is fully committed in 2017-18 and 2018-19.

Additional funding would need to be reallocated from another funding source under Outcome 1.

Under the HPAB guidelines, activities (undertaken by a peak body) considered eligible for funding are:

- Consultation with members on health sector policy and or programme matters for the purposes of providing relevant, well-informed information and advice to the Commonwealth.
- Activities that support the sharing of information about particular health matters, including Australian Government health policy and programme information, the prevention, treatment and control of diseases, the availability of health services and other matters affecting public health. These activities may include:
 - maintaining telephone and internet-based services for the purposes of disseminating accurate information:
 - o preparation of relevant content and materials for dissemination; and

- o promoting and supporting best practice.
- Inquiries, investigations, and provision of impartial, well-informed information and advice to the Australian Government on matters affecting public health.

An update of clinical/professional guidelines should meet the eligibility requirements of the HPAB Programme, namely *preparation of relevant content and materials for dissemination; and promoting and supporting best practice*.

Introduction

1. Grant opportunity overview and objectives

The Support for People Impacted by Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder Program (the Program) will run over three years, from 2018-19 to 2020-21.

ADHD is a childhood-onset condition and includes symptoms of hyperactivity, impulsivity and inattention. These symptoms are chronic and in approximately 30-60 per cent of cases, persist into adulthood. ADHD has a high burden of illness. It is associated with lowered academic functioning, increased risk for drug abuse and can have devastating consequences for family and peer relations. Economically, it is associated with increased costs, for example, treatment and educational support in school-aged children, as well as economic loss due to disability, substance abuse, criminality and increased rates of unemployment.

To address these issues, the Department will provide funding of \$1.5 million over three years to the Australian Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder Professionals Association (AADHDPA) to deliver the Support for People Impacted by ADHD Program (the Program). AADHDPA, a leading professional body for ADHD in Australia, brings together an interdisciplinary team of health professionals, including, but not limited to academics psychiatrists, speech therapists and specialists, to reflect the different approaches required to provide holistic care to those with ADHD.

The objectives of the grant are to support the AADHDPA in:

- bringing together, and consulting with, members of the health sector to provide impartial information and advice to the Commonwealth on ADHD diagnosis, treatment and management;
- gathering high quality data on ADHD in Australia and its inter-relationships with other mental health problems (e.g. substance abuse) and its societal impact;
- advising the Commonwealth on international policy and best practice on ADHD;
- preparing guidance materials that promote and support standardised evidence-based approaches to diagnosis, treatment and management of ADHD for health professionals; and
- disseminating educational materials to inform Government, clinicians, carers and educators of best practice in the care of children and adolescents with ADHD.

The grant contributes to the achievement of Outcome 2, Health Access and Support Services.

The expected outcomes of the grant activity are to formalise agreed best practice for the diagnosis and treatment of ADHD nationally, and to identify key research and public policy priorities.

The grant will be undertaken in accordance with the <u>Commonwealth Grants Rules and</u> <u>Guidelines (CGRGs)</u>

2. Grant selection process

This grant opportunity has been established as a one-off grant. It will support a broad range of health professionals to share information and agree on an evidence based holistic approach towards the diagnosis and treatment of ADHD at a national level.

3. Eligibility

If the potential grant recipient does not satisfy the eligibility criteria, it will not be considered.

To be eligible to receive a grant the potential grant recipient must:

- be a legal entity, able to enter into a legally binding agreement
- have an Australian Business Number
- be registered for the purposes of GST
- be a permanent resident of Australia
- have an Australian bank account

3.1 Who is eligible to apply for a grant?

AADHDPA is invited to apply for this grant opportunity as they have been assessed to have:

- capability to deliver the project activities in the project location
- existing infrastructure and relationships to support the project activities
- knowledge of and capability to deliver to the project objectives and outcomes.

AADHDPA is an established professional body that includes professionals from diverse backgrounds. They work together to provide a unified professional perspective on the causes, diagnosis, management and treatment of ADHD.

Funding will be provided as a one-off ad hoc process and there is no guarantee of continued funding once the program has been completed. If any decision were made in the future to consider expanding a similar project for a broader rollout, broader-based and competitive funding processes would be considered.

3.2 Eligible grant activities

The grant can be used for the following grant activities:

- Reviewing evidence around diagnosis, treatment and management of ADHD
- Developing materials in consultation with stakeholders
- Conducting consultations and focus groups
- Website and IT support to engage with the ADHD community and to collect data via surveys to inform guideline development
- Secretariat support

Costs that the grant can be used for are:

- Wages for scientific staff and secretariat support
- Consultation costs
- Communication materials
- General office needs

4. The assessment criteria

The proposal is required to provide sufficient information to allow the following assessment criteria to be evaluated:

Criterion 1: Demonstrate how the activities in your organisation's proposal will align with the one-off grant objectives.

Criterion 2: Demonstrate your organisation's capacity to deliver the proposed activities.

Criterion 3: Demonstrate how your proposed budget will provide value for money in achieving the one-off grant objectives.

5. Grant assessment and decision making

The application will be assessed by the Child and Youth Mental Health Section, Mental Health for Children and Adolescents, and Suicide Prevention Branch. The department may seek information from any other source, including from within the Commonwealth, whether or not the individuals or organisations contacted are nominated as referees.

The assessment of application will consider:

- · whether the proposal represents value with money
- alignment with program objectives
- organisational capacity and performance

6. Who will approve the grant?

Following assessment, the assessment committee will make recommendations to the decision maker. For the purposes of this grant, the Decision Maker unless otherwise specified will be the Assistant Secretary, Mental Health for Children and Adolescents, and Suicide Prevention Branch. The Decision Maker will make the final decision to approve a grant.

The Decision Maker's decision is final in all matters, including:

- the approval of the grant
- the grant amount to be awarded
- the terms and conditions of the grant.

The Decision Maker's must not approve funding if they reasonably consider the program funding available across financial years will not accommodate the funding offer, and/or if the application does not represent value with money.

There is no appeal mechanism for decisions to approve or not approve a grant.

7. Notification of application outcomes

The applicant will be advised of the outcome in writing, following a decision by the Assistant Secretary, Mental Health for Children and Adolescents and Suicide Prevention Branch. If the applicant is successful, the advice will contain details of any specific conditions attached to the grant.

7.1 The grant agreement

Successful applicants must enter into a legally binding grant agreement with the Commonwealth represented by the department. The department will use the *Commonwealth Standard Grant Agreement*. Standard terms and conditions for the grant agreement will apply and cannot be changed. A schedule may be used to outline the specific grant requirements. Any additional conditions attached to the grant will be identified in the grant offer or during the grant agreement negotiations.

The successful applicant will be required to provide income and expenditure reports.

The department will negotiate agreements with successful applicants by **[insert date]**. If there are unreasonable delays in finalising a grant agreement, the grant offer may be withdrawn and the grant may be awarded to a different applicant.

Financial commitments should not be made until a grant agreement has been executed by the Commonwealth.

8. Announcement of grants

However, I understand that the process for developing National Clinical Guidelines endorsed by NHMRC is quite rigorous, takes a significant period of time and can be costly. Part of the process includes the evaluation of the implementation and impact of the guidelines as well as regular revision.

Given funding from the Department is one-off and will only be up until June 2021, it would be good to get an understanding of how AADPA intends to undertake the NHMRC process, including evaluation and revision? The concern is that the currently identified timeframes and budget may not be feasible.

The other option is that we could fund the development of guidance material that is not NHMRC endorsed. AADPA may then choose to get this material endorsed at a later date. Not sure your thoughts on this?

Thank you for querying this and for bringing to my attention previous email correspondence from Chloe Stoddart. The primary concern raised by Ms Stoddart was whether we could accomplish an NHMRC endorsed national clinical guidelines within the period and budget of our grant (ending June 2021).

I can confirm that this is possible for a number of reasons. First, we are conducting an 'update' to a clinical guideline for ADHD that was published by NICE in 2018. Thus, a large amount of work has already been done. We are updating this based on current data and including additional questions of relevance for the Australian context. Our timeline for completion of this project is April 2021. At this time, the guideline will be submitted to the NHMRC council for consideration of approval. I note that even if we were to prepare a non-NHMRC guideline, these timeframes and budget would not differ; we would still need to follow best practices including obtaining broad stakeholder engagement; performing state-of-the-art evidence synthesis; making clinical recommendations based on evidence; writing the guideline; and submitting this to public consultation. The NHMRC process adds no additional burden in terms of time or cost.

So, to reiterate, the guideline can be prepared within budget and within the timeframe of the grant and thus I respectfully request that this activity be allowed to continue. We have already achieved much, have broad engagement from the national ADHD professional and consumer community and are making great progress. A national clinical guideline for ADHD is much desired by the Australian community and with this grant we are able to deliver this important work.

I note that the following was listed as point 4 in the strategic vision of our approved 2018-2019 Activity Work Plan that we received back from <u>s 22</u> on 13th May 2019. Our current activity aligns with what we stipulated:

The objectives of the grant are to support the AADPA in:

- bringing together, and consulting with, members of the health sector to provide impartial information and advice to the Commonwealth on ADHD diagnosis, treatment and management;
- gathering high quality data on ADHD in Australia and its inter-relationships with other mental health problems and its societal impact;
- advising the Commonwealth on international policy and best practice on ADHD;
- preparing guidance materials that promote and support standardised evidence-based approaches to diagnosis, treatment and management of ADHD for health professionals; and
- disseminating educational materials to inform Government, clinicians, carers and educators of best practice in the care of children and adolescents with ADHD.

The expected outcomes of the grant activity are to formalise agreed best practice for the diagnosis and treatment of ADHD nationally, and to identify key research and public policy priorities.

1. (a) Strategic Vision

During this activity period, the Australian ADHD Professionals Association (AADPA) will:

- Develop its website to enhance our ability to deliver information to clinicians treating ADHD and to consumers, and develop mental health literacy information for clinicians and consumers, including advice for COVID-19;
- (ii) continue the development of a series of systematic reviews that will identify barriers to care in Australia and areas of unmet need;
- (iii) implement high quality surveys to establish the research priorities of ADHD consumers, consumer needs, public perceptions and awareness of ADHD, and impact of COVID-19 on the mental health of individuals with ADHD;
- (iv) continue the formulation and implementation of national clinical guidelines for ADHD with a view to endorsement by the NHMRC and professional groups (RACP; RACGP, RANZCP; APS; NBPSA etc);
- (v) Continue to refine the development and implementation of the AADPA App developed in the previous reporting period which is designed to monitor treatment response and
