Issues:

- On 1 April 2019, you agreed to the Bilateral Agreement for the Way Back Support Service and signed a letter to formally offer the Agreement to the Northern Territory and Australian Capital Health Ministers, for commencement of the Agreement MS19-000541 (Attachment E).
- 2. The Northern Territory Minister for Health, the Hon Natasha Fyles MLA, and the Australian Capital Territory Minister for Mental Health, the Hon Shane Rattenbury MLA, have signed the Bilateral Agreements for Beyond Blue's the Way Back Support Service. Your countersignature is required to bring the Bilateral Agreements into effect for the jurisdictions. The Bilateral Agreements for your signature are at <u>Attachment A and B</u>. A copy of Minister Natasha Fyles and Minister Rattenbury's response are also included.

Background:

- The Way Back Support Service is a model of service delivery that provides follow-up care to individuals for up to three months following a suicide attempt or suicidal crisis by providing non-clinical, assertive outreach, follow-up care and practical support to individuals.
- The 2018-19 Budget measure Prioritising mental health aftercare following a suicide attempt comprises:
 - \$10.5 million for Beyond Blue to provide national support and oversee the implementation of the Way Back Support Service; and
 - \$27.1 million for PHNs to commission the Way Back Support Service, contingent on co-contributions from states and territories.
- Beyond Blue will contribute an additional \$5 million to support the measure.

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Header Agreement for the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure

Part 1 – Preliminaries and Intent

- The Commonwealth of Australia (the Commonwealth) and the states and territories have committed to work together, through the Fifth National Mental Health and Suicide Prevention Plan, to ensure there is consistent and timely follow-up care for people who have attempted suicide.
- 2. This Bilateral Agreement (the Agreement) recognises the mutual interest and investment of the Commonwealth and the states and territories in ensuring people discharged from hospital following a suicide attempt or suicidal crisis have access to appropriate follow-up care that supports them to engage with, and stay connected to, the health and social supports needed to enhance their prospects of recovery.
- The Agreement sets out an agreed approach to progress the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure.
- 4. This Agreement is entered into on the understanding that the states and territories will not be disadvantaged or worse off as a result of any subsequent agreement the Commonwealth makes with any other state or territory that could impact on the implementation and financial contributions of the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure in the states and territories.

Part 2 - Parties and Operation of Agreement

Parties to the Agreement

The Agreement is between the Commonwealth and the states and territories.

Commencement, duration and review of the Agreement

- 6. The Agreement will commence on the date of signing,
- The Agreement will expire on 30 June 2022. The Commonwealth and the states and territories will consider arrangements beyond this point.

Interoperability

- 8. The Agreement is to be considered in conjunction with:
 - a. The Fifth National Mental Health and Suicide Prevention Plan;
 - b. The National Healthcare Agreement 2012; and
 - c. Any relevant state and territory mental health plans.

- 9. Schedules to this Agreement include, but are not limited to:
 - a. Schedule A: Implementation Plan

Part 3 — Objectives, Outcomes and Activities

- The overarching objective of the Agreement is to support the implementation of the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure to:
 - expand the Way Back Support Service in selected Primary Health Network regions to provide follow-up care for individuals for up to three months after a suicide attempt or suicidal crisis;
 - reduce suicide re-attempts and deaths for individuals following a suicide attempt or suicidal crisis; and
 - reduce readmissions to hospital emergency departments and enhance the likelihood of recovery for Individuals after a suicide attempt or suicidal crisis.
- 11. The Parties will contribute to the achievement of these objectives and outcomes through:
 - a. demonstrating a financial commitment to support the commissioning of the Way Back Support Service in selected Primary Health Network regions;
 - supporting an integrated approach to service planning and coordination between Beyond Blue, Primary Health Networks and Local Hospital Networks to improve service pathways for individuals after a suicide attempt or suicidal crisis;
 - assisting to promote the Way Back Support Service in participating regions, while taking into account other relevant supports available to assist individuals recovering from a suicide attempt or suicidal crisis; and
 - d. supporting and contributing to the sharing of relevant health service data to inform monitoring and evaluation of the Way Back Support Service,
- All activities undertaken under this Agreement should be consistent with the priorities and objectives of the Fifth National Mental Health and Suicide Prevention Plan.

Data Collection

 The Parties agree to support the collection and provision of data on the implementation and progress of the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure as specified in Schedule A: Implementation Plan.

Areas for Collaboration

- 14. The Parties agree to work together, in conjunction with Beyond Blue, Primary Health Networks, and other stakeholders, to establish priority locations for the Way Back Support Service.
- The Parties agree to work together and with Beyond Blue to ensure that Activities funded under this Agreement are consistent with the Way Back Support Service model.

Part 4 — Roles and responsibilities

16. The Parties agree to work together to implement, monitor, refine and evaluate the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure under the Agreement, and agree to share information to assist with planning and policy development, subject to privacy requirements.

Part 5 — Monitoring progress and evaluation

Bilateral Monitoring Progress

- 17. Progress will be monitored and reported in accordance with Schedule A: Implementation Plan. This will support early identification and/or resolution of implementation issues; inform refinement of the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure; and support evaluation of Agreement activities.
- 18. Monitoring activities will include:
 - updates as required on implementation progress and emerging risks or issues through relevant governance committees convened by Beyond Blue;
 - b. bilateral officer-level discussions as required on implementation progress and emerging risks or issues; and
 - c. ad hoc reporting, as agreed by the Parties.

Evaluation

- The Commonwealth will fund Beyond Blue to commission an evaluation of the Way Back Support Service for the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure.
 - Beyond Blue will consult with the Parties on the evaluation through relevant governance committees convened by Beyond Blue.
 - b. The evaluation will examine the implementation of the Way Back Support Service in preventing suicide and improving care for people who have been discharged from hospital following a suicide attempt.
 - c. The Commonwealth will provide a copy of the evaluation report to jurisdictions.

Risk and Issues Management

- 20. The Parties agree that they will continually monitor, review and take necessary action to manage risks over the life of the Agreement. Where agreed by both Parties, relevant Schedules will be updated to reflect any substantive changes or extension to activities to effectively manage identified risks.
- Each Party agrees to provide the other Party with reasonable prior notice in writing on any implementation issues and risks that may impact on the progress or success of the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure activities.
- 22. If risks eventuate at any time for either party, the Party with primary responsibility for the risk will work with the other Party and Beyond Blue to develop agreed mitigation proposals.

Part 6 – Stakeholders

23. To support appropriate linkages and align Agreement activities with existing programs and services, the Parties will communicate as appropriate with key stakeholders, as identified by the Parties, throughout the life of the Agreement, including through existing communication channels, mechanisms and forums.

Part 7 - Communications

- The Parties agree to a collaborative and cooperative approach to external communications consistent with the alms of this Agreement.
- 25. The Parties agree to consult with one another and Beyond Blue about any significant publications or announcements, including media releases, relating to this Agreement to ensure that each party has sufficient time to participate in those opportunities.
- 26. If there is any doubt about the significance of a proposed publication or announcement, the Parties agree to liaise with each other and Beyond Blue to determine whether the other Party or Beyond Blue wish to be involved.
- The Parties will use all reasonable endeavours to respond to each other in respect of urgent publications or announcements in a timely manner.

Part 8 — Governance of the Agreement

Disputes under the Agreement

- Any Party may give notice in writing to the other Party of a dispute under the Agreement.
- The Parties will attempt to resolve any dispute at officer-level in the first instance.
- If the issue cannot be resolved at officer-level, it may be escalated to the relevant executive officers and Ministers.

Variation of the Agreement

31. The Agreement and its Schedules may be amended at any time by agreement in writing by the relevant Parties.

Enforceability of the Agreement

32. The Parties do not intend any of the provisions of the Agreement to be legally enforceable. However, this does not lessen the Parties' commitment to the Agreement.

Termination of the Agreement

- 33. The Parties may withdraw from the Agreement by giving six months' written notice to the other Parties and Beyond Blue.
- 34. Following notification of a Party's Intention to withdraw from the Agreement, the terms of the withdrawal, including the date on which the Party will cease to be a Party, and any legislative changes and other arrangements that may be necessary as a consequence of the withdrawal, will be negotiated in good faith and agreed between the Parties, on a basis which aims to ensure continuity of support for people in receipt of supports funded through the Agreement.

Definitions

35. The following definitions are applicable throughout the Agreement and all Schedules to the Agreement.

Implementation Plan

Commonwealth and the Northern Territory Aftercare following a suicide attempt Bilateral Agreement

PART 1 — Preliminaries

 The arrangements in this Schedule will be implemented by the Parties as outlined in the Header Agreement for the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure (the Agreement) and should be read in conjunction with that Agreement.

PART 2 — Terms of this Schedule

- 2. The implementation of this Schedule by the Parties will commence on the date of signing and expire on 30 June 2022.
- The purpose of this Schedule is to guide implementation of the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure and demonstrate the Parties' ability to achieve the outcomes of the Agreement.

PART 3 — Core Characteristics

Projects and project information

The Parties agree to the roles and responsibilities outlined in this Schedule for implementing the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure.

Matched funding requirements

- In the 2018-19 Pederal Budget the Commonwealth committed \$37.6 million over four years (2018-19 to 2021-22) for the Prioritising Mental Health: Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure.
- Commonwealth funding for the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure will be divided across two fundamental components:
 - a. Funding of up to \$27.1 million will be provided to Primary Health Networks to commission services to be accessed by The Way Back Support Service clients.
 - b. Funding of \$10.5 million will be provided to Beyond Blue to provide national support and oversee the implementation of The Way Back Support Service in selected Primary Health Network regions, including \$2.5 million to supplement regional service delivery and \$3 million to build capacity within Primary Health Networks and Local Hospital Networks.
- Commonwealth investment in national support and oversight for the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure (Part 3, Item 6b) will be administered independent of this Agreement.

- Commonwealth investment in service delivery for the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure (Part 3, Item 6a) in the Northern Territory will be dependent on matched financial commitment by the Northern Territory Government.
- The Commonwealth funding commitment for the service delivery component of the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure is outlined in Table 1.

Monitoring and reporting

- 11. The Parties agree to support the collection and provision of the following data on the implementation and progress of the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure:
 - the number of emergency department presentations for ailments associated with a suicide attempt or suicidal crisis;
 - b. the number of presentations suitable for referral to The Way Back Support Service;
 - c. the number of presentations for which a Mental State Examination was conducted and identified a sulcide attempt or suicidal crisis; and
 - d. any other data as agreed by the Parties.

PART 4 — Implementation of The Way Back Support Service in the Northern Territory

- 12. The Parties agree that funding for the service delivery component of the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure, as specified in Part 3, Item 9 and Item 10, will be provided to the relevant Primary Health Network/s to commission The Way Back Support Service.
- 13. The Northern Territory Government and the Commonwealth will jointly fund the Northern Territory Primary Health Network to commission a service provider to deliver the Way Back Support Service in Darwin from 2018-19 to 2021-22, with an anticipated annual caseload of up to 180 people.
- 14. The Darwin Way Back Support Service site will accept referrals from eligible clients presenting at:
 - e. Community Mental Health Services;
 - f. the Royal Darwin Hospital; or
 - g. Other referral pathways agreed by the Northern Territory Government, the Commonwealth and Beyond Blue.
- 15. The Way Back Support Service will provide tailored practical support delivered as assertive outreach to eligible individuals for up to three months following a suicide attempt or (where service capacity permits) a suicidal crisis.
- 15. The Way Back Support Service will be provided by trained non-clinical Support Coordinators, operating under clinical supervision. Support Coordinators will operate with a caseload capacity of 15 cases per full time Support Coordinator.
- 17. The Parties may agree to fund additional The Way Back Support Service locations in the Northern Territory. Any new locations will be selected in consultation with Beyond Blue and funding arrangements will be negotiated between the Parties.

 - b. The evaluation will examine the implementation of the Way Back Support Service in preventing suicide and improving care for people who have been discharged from hospital following a suicide attempt.
 - c. The Commonwealth will provide a copy of the evaluation report to jurisdictions.

Risk and Issues Management

Issues:

- On 12 November 2018, you agreed to 16 site locations (Tranche 1) for the expansion of Beyond Blue's The Way Back Support Service (Way Back) including writing to the state and territory Health Ministers to commence negotiations. You also agreed to formalise arrangements via Bilateral Agreements with the state and territories with final versions subject to your approval MS18-002188 (Attachment C).

Page 1

- In the 2018-19 Federal Budget the Commonwealth committed \$37.6 million over four years (2018-19 to 2021-22) for the Prioritising Mental Health: Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure.
- Commonwealth funding for the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure will be divided across two fundamental components:
 - a. Funding of up to \$27.1 million will be provided to Primary Health Networks to commission services to be accessed by The Way Back Support Service clients.
 - b. Funding of \$10.5 million will be provided to Beyond Blue to provide national support and oversee the implementation of The Way Back Support Service in selected Primary Health Network regions, including \$2.5 million to supplement regional service delivery and \$3 million to build capacity within Primary Health Networks and Local Hospital Networks.
- Commonwealth investment in national support and oversight for the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure (Part 3, Item 6b) will be administered independent of this Agreement.

- Commonwealth investment in service delivery for the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure (Part 3, Item 6a) in the Australian Capital Territory will be dependent on matched financial commitment by the Australian Capital Territory Government.
- 9. The Commonwealth funding commitment for the service delivery component of the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure is outlined in Table 1.

Monitoring and reporting

- The Parties agree to support the collection and provision of the following data on the implementation and progress of the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure:
 - a. the number of emergency department presentations for ailments associated with a suicide attempt or suicidal crisis;
 - b. the number of presentations suitable for referral to the Way Back Support Service;
 - c. the number of presentations for which a Mental State Examination was conducted and identified a suicide attempt or suicidal crisis; and
 - d. any other data as agreed by the Parties.

PART 4 — Implementation of The Way Back Support Service in the Australian Capital Territory

- 12. The Parties agree that funding for the service delivery component of the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure, as specified in Part 3, Item 9 and Item 10, will be provided to the relevant Primary Health Network/s to commission The Way Back Support Service.
- The Australian Capital Territory Government and the Commonwealth will jointly fund the Australian Capital Territory Primary Health Network to commission a service provider to deliver the Way Back Support Service in Canberra from 2019-20 to 2021-22, with an anticipated annual caseload of up to 290 people.
- The Canberra Way Back Support Service site will accept referrals from eligible clients presenting at a:
 - a. Community Mental Health Services;
 - b. the Canberra and Calvary Hospitals; or
 - c. Other referral pathways agreed by the Australian Capital Territory Government, the Commonwealth, the Australian Capital Territory Primary Health Network and Beyond Blue.
- The Way Back Support Service will provide tailored practical support delivered as assertive outreach to eligible individuals for up to three months following a suicide attempt or (where service capacity permits) a suicidal crisis.
- The Way Back Support Service will be provided by trained non-clinical Support Coordinators, operating under clinical supervision. Support Coordinators will operate with a caseload capacity of 15 cases per full time Support Coordinator.

Header Agreement for the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure

Part 1 – Preliminaries and Intent

- The Commonwealth of Australia (the Commonwealth) and the states and territories have committed to work together, through the Fifth National Mental Health and Suicide Prevention Plan, to ensure there is consistent and timely follow-up care for people who have attempted suicide.
- 2. This Bilateral Agreement (the Agreement) recognises the mutual interest and investment of the Commonwealth and the states and territories in ensuring people discharged from hospital following a suicide attempt or suicidal crisis have access to appropriate follow-up care that supports them to engage with, and stay connected to, the health and social supports needed to enhance their prospects of recovery.
- The Agreement sets out an agreed approach to progress the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure.
- 4. This Agreement is entered into on the understanding that the states and territories will not be disadvantaged or worse off as a result of any subsequent agreement the Commonwealth makes with any other state or territory that could impact on the implementation and financial contributions of the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure in the states and territories.

Part 2 — Parties and Operation of Agreement

Parties to the Agreement

The Agreement is between the Commonwealth and the states and territories.

Commencement, duration and review of the Agreement

- 6. The Agreement will commence on the date of signing.
- The Agreement will expire on 30 June 2022. The Commonwealth and the states and territories will consider arrangements beyond this point.

Interoperability

- 8. The Agreement is to be considered in conjunction with:
 - a. The Fifth National Mental Health and Suicide Prevention Plan;
 - b. The National Healthcare Agreement 2012; and
 - c. Any relevant state and territory mental health plans.

- 9. Schedules to this Agreement include, but are not limited to:
 - a. Schedule A: Implementation Plan

Part 3 – Objectives, Outcomes and Activities

- The overarching objective of the Agreement is to support the Implementation of the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure to:
 - expand the Way Back Support Service in selected Primary Health Network regions to provide follow-up care for individuals for up to three months after a suicide attempt or suicidal crisis;
 - reduce suicide re-attempts and deaths for individuals following a suicide attempt or suicidal crisis; and
 - reduce readmissions to hospital emergency departments and enhance the likelihood of recovery for individuals after a suicide attempt or suicidal crisis.
- 11. The Parties will contribute to the achievement of these objectives and outcomes through:
 - a. demonstrating a financial commitment to support the commissioning of the Way Back Support Service in selected Primary Health Network regions;
 - supporting an integrated approach to service planning and coordination between Beyond Blue, Primary Health Networks and Local Hospital Networks to improve service pathways for Individuals after a suicide attempt or suicidal crisis;
 - assisting to promote the Way Back Support Service in participating regions, while taking into account other relevant supports available to assist individuals recovering from a suicide attempt or suicidal crisis; and
 - supporting and contributing to the sharing of relevant health service data to inform monitoring and evaluation of the Way Back Support Service.
- All activities undertaken under this Agreement should be consistent with the priorities and objectives of the Fifth National Mental Health and Suicide Prevention Plan.

Data Collection

 The Parties agree to support the collection and provision of data on the implementation and progress of the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure as specified in Schedule A: Implementation Plan.

Areas for Collaboration

- The Parties agree to work together, in conjunction with Beyond Blue, Primary Health Networks, and other stakeholders, to establish priority locations for the Way Back Support Service.
- The Parties agree to work together and with Beyond Blue to ensure that Activities funded under this Agreement are consistent with the Way Back Support Service model.

Part 4 — Roles and responsibilities

16. The Parties agree to work together to implement, monitor, refine and evaluate the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure under the Agreement, and agree to share information to assist with planning and policy development, subject to privacy requirements.

Part 5 — Monitoring progress and evaluation

Bilateral Monitoring Progress

- 17. Progress will be monitored and reported in accordance with Schedule A: Implementation Plan. This will support early identification and/or resolution of implementation issues; inform refinement of the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure; and support evaluation of Agreement activities.
- 18. Monitoring activities will include:
 - updates as required on implementation progress and emerging risks or issues through relevant governance committees convened by Beyond Blue;
 - b. bilateral officer-level discussions as required on Implementation progress and emerging risks or issues; and
 - c. ad hoc reporting, as agreed by the Parties.

Evaluation

- The Commonwealth will fund Beyond Blue to commission an evaluation of the Way Back Support Service for the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure.
 - Beyond Blue will consult with the Parties on the evaluation through relevant governance committees convened by Beyond Blue.
 - b. The evaluation will examine the implementation of the Way Back Support Service in preventing suicide and improving care for people who have been discharged from hospital following a suicide attempt.
 - c. The Commonwealth will provide a copy of the evaluation report to jurisdictions.

Risk and Issues Management

- 20. The Parties agree that they will continually monitor, review and take necessary action to manage risks over the life of the Agreement. Where agreed by both Parties, relevant Schedules will be updated to reflect any substantive changes or extension to activities to effectively manage identified risks.
- Each Party agrees to provide the other Party with reasonable prior notice in writing on any implementation issues and risks that may impact on the progress or success of the Aftercare following a suicide attempt measure activities.
- If risks eventuate at any time for either party, the Party with primary responsibility for the risk will work with the other Party and Beyond Blue to develop agreed mitigation proposals.

Part 6 - Stakeholders

23. To support appropriate linkages and align Agreement activities with existing programs and services, the Parties will communicate as appropriate with key stakeholders, as identified by the Parties, throughout the life of the Agreement, including through existing communication channels, mechanisms and forums.

Part 7 – Communications

- 24. The Parties agree to a collaborative and cooperative approach to external communications consistent with the aims of this Agreement.
- 25. The Parties agree to consult with one another and Beyond Blue about any significant publications or announcements, including media releases, relating to this Agreement to ensure that each party has sufficient time to participate in those opportunities.
- 26. If there is any doubt about the significance of a proposed publication or announcement, the Parties agree to liaise with each other and Beyond Blue to determine whether the other Party or Beyond Blue wish to be involved.
- The Parties will use all reasonable endeavours to respond to each other in respect of urgent publications or announcements in a timely manner.

Part 8 — Governance of the Agreement

Disputes under the Agreement

- Any Party may give notice in writing to the other Party of a dispute under the Agreement.
- The Parties will attempt to resolve any dispute at officer-level in the first instance.
- If the issue cannot be resolved at officer-level, it may be escalated to the relevant executive officers and Ministers.

Variation of the Agreement

 The Agreement and Its Schedules may be amended at any time by agreement in writing by the relevant Parties.

Enforceability of the Agreement

32. The Parties do not intend any of the provisions of the Agreement to be legally enforceable. However, this does not lessen the Parties' commitment to the Agreement.

Termination of the Agreement

- 33. The Parties may withdraw from the Agreement by giving six months' written notice to the other Parties and Beyond Blue.
- 34. Following notification of a Party's intention to withdraw from the Agreement, the terms of the withdrawal, including the date on which the Party will cease to be a Party, and any legislative changes and other arrangements that may be necessary as a consequence of the withdrawal, will be negotiated in good faith and agreed between the Parties, on a basis which aims to ensure continuity of support for people in receipt of supports funded through the Agreement.

Definitions

35. The following definitions are applicable throughout the Agreement and all Schedules to the Agreement.

- 14. The Darwin Way Back Support Service site will accept referrals from eligible clients presenting at:
 - e. Community Mental Health Services;
 - f. the Royal Darwin Hospital; or
 - g. Other referral pathways agreed by the Northern Territory Government, the Commonwealth and Beyond Blue.
- 15. The Way Back Support Service will provide tailored practical support delivered as assertive outreach to eligible individuals for up to three months following a suicide attempt or (where service capacity permits) a suicidal crisis.
- 16. The Way Back Support Service will be provided by trained non-clinical Support Coordinators, operating under clinical supervision. Support Coordinators will operate with a caseload capacity of 15 cases per full time Support Coordinator.
- 17. The Parties may agree to fund additional The Way Back Support Service locations in the Northern Territory. Any new locations will be selected in consultation with Beyond Blue and funding arrangements will be negotiated between the Parties.
