- 1. Approve the commitment of \$309.968 million for grants under CHHP and other budget measures commencing in 2018-19 at Attachment A.
- **2. Approve** the Department offering funding agreements to deliver on projects approved at Attachment A.
- 3. Note that nine projects in this list are to be delivered through payments to 15 Primary Health Networks (PHNs). Overview at Attachment B.
- **4. Agree** the operational funding for PHN projects be applied as outlined at <u>Attachment B</u>.
- **5. Sign** the letter at <u>Attachment C</u> notifying the Finance Minister that funding is recommended to be granted in your electorate.

1. Your approval is sought to the commitment of \$309.968 million (GST exclusive) for projects over seven years (2018-19 to 2024-25) under CHHP and other health measures from the 2019-20 Budget, outlined in the assessment summary at Attachment A. GST will be added to

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organisations where applicable. Your policy approval was sought previously (refer MS19-900146).

- 2. If approved, the Department will then be able to offer funding agreement for the grants starting in 2018-19 at Attachment A. To assist with the administration of the approved grants we seek your agreement to departmental staff being responsible for entering into the grant arrangements and ongoing grant administration, including the ability to effect variations to the grants which are not significant in nature (such as application of GST, minor changes to the grant value or project scope or parameters), subject to the funded activities continuing to promote the program outcomes.
- 3. Specific risks for some grants have been identified with a proposed approach to mitigating them. In addition, to deliver on the Government's commitments and avoid risking funding available in 2018-19, a number of projects have the full funding amount to be provided in the first payment under the agreement. While all funding agreements will include provision to recover funds that are not spent for the agreed purpose, this is more difficult when the funding is provided in this way.
- 4. There are two proposals in Attachment A where high risks have been identified:
 - a. Project funding of \$750,000 in 2018-19 to build the George Church Medical Centre in Kojonup requires close management. The Shire Council has expressed concerns about the construction of a new health facility in Kojonup due to capacity in existing facilities: the difficulty of attracting general practitioners to the area; the small population of Kojonup; and Katanning is about 25 km from Kojonup and has a district hospital (which recently received state government funding of \$32 million to upgrade facilities) and private medical practices. To mitigate this risk, the department will include a condition in the funding agreement for the provision of an operational plan, within three months of execution of the agreement, to demonstrate the viability of the project.
 - b. Project funding of \$5 million to Lord Somers Camp and Power House to develop a new Power House Community Hub. The Department has insufficient information to allow a full value for money assessment, clearly linking the proposal to the objectives and outcomes of the CHHP. The project also relies on the Victorian government granting a lease extension to the proponents by February 2020. To deliver on the Government's commitment, the Department recommends funding for this project be provided under Program 2.4 for preventive health. This provides a better alignment with program objectives. The funding agreement will also ensure that funding is contingent on securing a renewed lease. There is sufficient appropriation available within Program 2.4 to enable the initial payment of \$500,000 for this project in 2018-19. You will need to seek the Finance Minister's approval to reallocate the remaining funding of \$4.5 million between outcomes. We will prepare a letter for this reallocation of funding in due course.

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6. Funding under all projects to the PHNs include an operational funding element applied consistently across all PHN projects. This is in line with existing operational funding levels for PHN commissioning in other parts of the PHN Program, such as for headspace services.

All of the nine projects identified for delivery by the PHNs from 2018-19 require some form of commissioning or substantial administration. Only one project, flying Headspace in SA Country PHN, names partner organisations for delivery.

It is anticipated some of the PHNs will raise concerns about whether this is sufficient but these will be managed case by case.

- 7. Funding of \$13 million in 2018-19 under the National Headspace Waitlist Reduction, will provide \$10.37 million to 10 PHNs to support headspace centres with the highest waiting times. The remaining \$2.63 million is allocated to headspace National to provide dedicated online clinical support to headspace centres with high waiting times, focusing on rural and regional areas, and to provide advice and support to PHNs on strategies to reduce waiting times, undertake analysis and reporting, and commission new services. Funding to PHNs will continue in 2020-21 and a further submission will be provided in the new financial year seeking your approval, noting the Budget measure does not have an allocation of funding in 2019-20. This will allow for the outcomes of the initial work with headspace National and the first 10 PHNs to inform a longer term agreement.
- 8. Whilst the Government has approved the funding at a project level, the *Commonwealth Grant Rules and Guidelines* (CGRGs) still require any funding granted in your electorate to be recorded and advised to the Finance Minister as soon as practicable. A letter to the Finance Minister is included at <u>Attachment Cfor your signature</u>.

Background:

Given the limited time to execute payments before the end of the current financial year, the department has undertaken a condensed grants process compliant with the CGRGs. This included the development of an Assessment Plan and Grant Opportunity Guidelines (GOGs) to guide the assessment process.

In accordance with s71 of the *Public Governance, Performance and Accountability Act 2013* (PGPA Act), in order to approve the grants you must be satisfied (after making reasonable inquiries) the expenditure is a proper use of relevant money.

Further information, including your Ministerial obligations under the PGPA Act CGRGs, is provided in <u>Attachment D</u>.

As previously advised, a letter of intent will need to be co-signed prior to 30 June 2019 by funding recipients and the department for any projects where funding agreements cannot be executed before the end of financial year processing deadlines, to support the processing of accruals.

Budget/Financial Implications: Commitment of \$309.968 million is in line with decisions of government and appropriations outlined in the 2019-20 Budget.

Relevance to Election Commitments / Budget Measures: The CHHP was announced during the 2018-19 Mid-Year Economic and Fiscal Outlook (MYEFO). Additional projects were announced in the 2019-20 Budget under several Budget measures.

Sensitivities: The need for additional information from project proponents, or to negotiate details of more complex projects, may delay offering a formal grant agreement. This will be managed as needed on an individual basis.

Consultations: Consultations are continuing with AGS, the Health Grants and Network Division and Budget Branch.

Impact on Rural and Regional Australians: Rural health is a key focus area for consideration of funding through the CHHP.

Mandatory Grant Rules and Guidelines & Other Requirements

- The CGRGs require Ministers to comply with relevant legislative requirements in the PGPA Act and the CGRGs and officials are required to advise their Ministers on these requirements. In making your decision you will need to consider your mandatory obligations associated with approving grants presented by the Department. These include:
- a. If you approve expenditure under section 71 of the PGPA Act, in relation to a grant or group of grants, you must not approve the grant without first receiving written advice from Department staff on the merits of the proposed grant or group of grants before you make your decision. That advice must meet the requirements of paragraph 4.6 of the Commonwealth Grant Rules and Guidelines (CGRGs).
- b. If the proposed expenditure of relevant money relates to a grant, where you exercise the role of approver you *must* also record, in writing, the basis for the approval relative to the grant guidelines and key considerations of value with relevant money. The recommended basis and record for the approval, relative to the grant guidelines and the key consideration of value for money, are set out in this brief. If there is any alternative basis or considerations on which you are basing your decision you should record these in accordance with clause 4.11 of the CGRGs.
- c. If you approve a grant the Department has not recommended for funding (e.g. because it is ineligible or because it is not competitive or value for money), you must provide written advice of the basis of your approval for reporting to the Department of Finance in line with the CGRG annual reporting requirement in paragraph 4.13 of the CGRGs, i.e. by 31 March each year for grants approved in the preceding calendar year.
- Consistent with section 71 of the *Public Governance, Performance and Accountability Act 2013* (PGPA Act) you must not approve a grant unless, after reasonable enquiry, you are satisfied that these grants would be a proper use of relevant money.
- If your approval is not given, or is made conditional on the applicant meeting additional obligations, please advise the reasons for your decision and any conditions placed on the approval, for follow-up by the Department.
- For the majority of grants, once the grant is approved, the Secretary or their delegate, will approve the commitment of relevant money under s23(3) of the PGPA Act and enter into the arrangement pursuant to s23(1) of the PGPA Act or s32B of the *Financial Framework* (Supplementary Powers) Act 1997 (and 32C if applicable) as the case requires. For grants made under specific statutory legislation the brief will contain details of the relevant statutory framework and approvals.
- The Department is responsible for ensuring forward year commitments are recorded in accordance with the PGPA Act. The Department will record any applicable amounts if you approve the grant/s recommended in this brief.

- 2. As a result of the High Court's decisions in Williams v Commonwealth of Australia (2012) and Williams v Commonwealth of Australia (No. 2) (2014), Commonwealth expenditure requires constitutional support and legislative authority, with limited exceptions, as well as an appropriation. The Department of Finance has issued Estimates Memorandum 2017/34 (the EM) where it is set out that a Constitutional Risk Assessment in relation to new policy proposals is required. In the normal process, AGS risk assessment is obtained and considered by Cabinet before proposals are agreed. In the case of CHHP and other projects funded in the 2019-20 Budget, funding was agreed through letters prior to the AGS risk assessment.

- 6. All of these specific projects under CHHP have been the subject of Budget consideration and given authority to proceed by the Prime Minister. On this basis, the Department proposes to execute the agreements in line with Cabinet authority, s42
 - Funding for each specific project has already been agreed by Government, and all projects have been announced.
 - b. While there is some risk of adverse commentary from the Australian National Audit Office and from any parties opposed to the expenditure, delaying or not proceeding with projects also carries risk given stakeholder commitments on the basis of Budget announcements.
 - Given these are one-off grants, the likelihood of them being legally challenged is low.
 - d. s42 will be mitigated to some extent through strong grants management processes established to run through the life of each agreement, to ensure that funds are spent for the intended purpose.

Sensitivities:

Executing grant agreements for the s42 carries the risk of adverse commentary from the Australian National Audit Office, the Joint Committee of Public Accounts and Audit, and/or those opposed to the expenditure. However, stakeholders are expecting to receive funding in 2018-19 in line with Budget decisions and the risk of legal challenge on individual projects is relatively low.

Consultations: Consultation is ongoing with the AGS, and has occurred with Finance and PM&C, as well as the Legal and Assurance and Financial Management Divisions.

Impact on Rural and Regional Australians: Rural health is a key focus area for consideration of funding through the CHHP.
