UPDATED 2023 COVID-19 BOOSTER ADVICE

The Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI) have updated their **recommendations** on the use of booster doses of COVID-19 vaccine in 2023.

This advice provides guidance about who should consider receiving an additional dose of a COVID-19 vaccine in 2023. The full <u>ATAGI update</u> can be found on the Department of Health and Aged Care website (www.health.gov.au).

Key points:

- All adults aged 75 years or older <u>should receive</u> an additional 2023 COVID-19 vaccine dose if 6 months have passed since their last dose.
- The following adults should <u>consider</u> an additional 2023 COVID-19 vaccine dose if it has been 6 months since their last dose, after discussion with their healthcare provider:
 - all adults aged 65 to 74 years, and/or
 - adults aged 18 to 64 years with <u>severe immunocompromise</u>.

Within the above groups, an additional 2023 COVID-19 vaccine is likely to be of most benefit for people who:

- have **no known history of COVID infection** (and therefore are unlikely to have protection from hybrid immunity),
- have conditions that increase their risk of severe COVID-19, or disability with significant or complex health needs, or
- reside in a residential aged care facility.

ATAGI continues to encourage all adults who were recommended to have a COVID-19 vaccine dose in February 2023, and who have not yet had one, to receive a vaccine dose as soon as possible.

COVID-19 Vaccination Program

Primary care clinicians such as general practitioners and pharmacists will continue to be the main providers of COVID-19 vaccines in disability accommodation settings. This is consistent with the National COVID-19 Health Management Plan.
