COVID-19 is still a health risk for people with disability

COVID-19 is still around and a threat to people with disability. Some people with disability have health conditions that put them at greater risk of bad outcomes including death from COVID-19.

For the best protection against serious illness or death from COVID-19, people with disability should get all recommended doses for their age or individual health needs. COVID-19 vaccine doses are important to maintain protection.

To find out about eligibility for a COVID-19 dose:

- visit <u>www.health.gov.au</u>, or
- talk to a healthcare provider.

Some vaccination services can visit people at home if they cannot travel to the service.

To book an appointment, go to the <u>service finder</u>, <u>Disability Gateway</u>, or use the <u>EVA (Easy</u> <u>Vaccine Access</u>) call back service.

Additional 2023 COVID-19 dose advice

In September 2023, the Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI) provided further recommendations about who should get an <u>additional</u> COVID-19 vaccine dose in 2023 (<u>an additional dose for highest risk people</u>). The full <u>ATAGI statement</u> is on the Department of Health and Aged Care website (<u>www.health.gov.au</u>).

Key points:

- All adults aged 75 years or older are <u>recommended</u> to get an <u>additional</u> 2023 COVID-19 dose if 6 months have passed since their last dose.
- The following adults should <u>consider</u> an <u>additional</u> 2023 COVID-19 dose if it has been 6 months since their last dose, after talking to their healthcare provider:
 - o all adults aged 65 to 74 years,
 - adults aged 18 to 64 years with severe immunocompromise.

All adults for whom ATAGI recommended a COVID-19 vaccine dose in <u>February 2023</u>, and have not yet had one, are encouraged to get their dose as soon as possible.

COVID-19 vaccine information flyers

The Department of Health and Aged Care has published two flyers on its website about the 2023 COVID-19 booster and an <u>additional</u> COVID-19 vaccine dose for highest risk people, including how to book a vaccination appointment:

- For disability service providers and
- For people with disability, their carers and families.

These can be used electronically or in print.

COVID-19 stakeholder kit for disability service providers

An updated stakeholder kit of COVID-19 information and resources is available from the Disability Gateway. The kit is designed to help organisations continue to communicate the importance of preventive behaviours to reduce the risk of COVID-19 and includes videos and factsheets.

Disability Worker COVID-19 Leave Grant

The second submission period of the <u>Disability Worker COVID-19 Leave Grant</u> is **now open** for applications on <u>GrantConnect</u>.

NDIS providers will be eligible for reimbursement under this grant if they make a payment to disability workers who:

- 1. deliver close personal support to NDIS participants,
- 2. have lost hours due to a COVID-19 infection, and
- 3. have insufficient or no sick leave.

Available funding is at a flat rate of:

- \$450 per worker, where the worker lost at least eight hours and up to and including 20 hours of work, and
- \$750 per worker where the worker lost more than 20 hours of work.

Applications are due on **6 November 2023** for payments providers have made to workers for hours lost between **1 July 2023 and 30 September 2023**.
