This info sheet is about getting the **COVID-19 vaccine** when you are

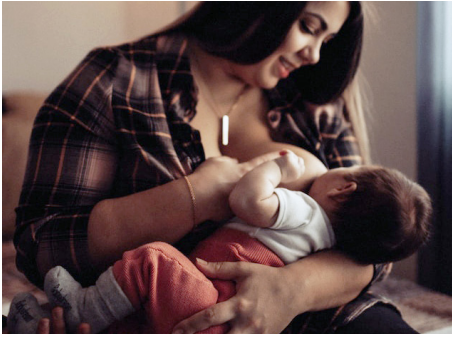
- **Pregnant**

The **COVID-19 vaccine** is a medicine that can help stop you from getting very sick from COVID-19.



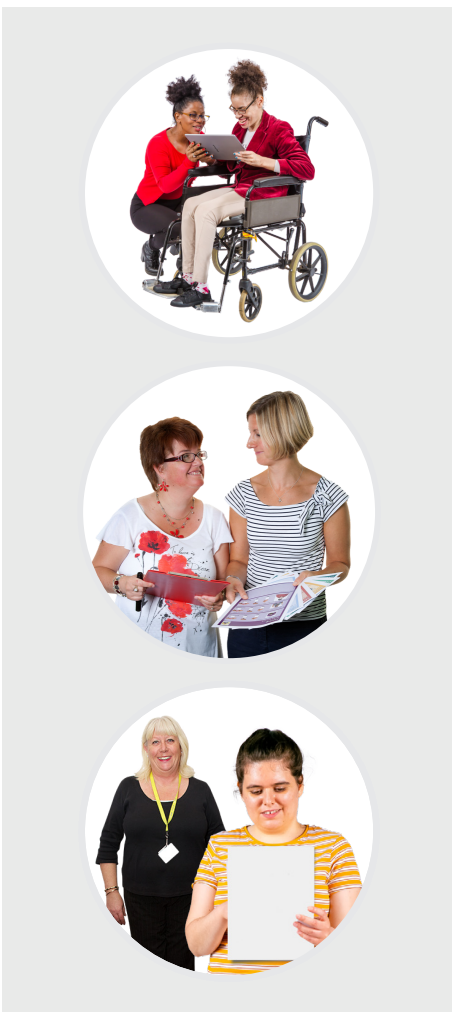
Pregnant means that you are having a baby.



Breastfeeding means that you feed your baby with milk from your breasts.



You can ask someone for help to read this info sheet.



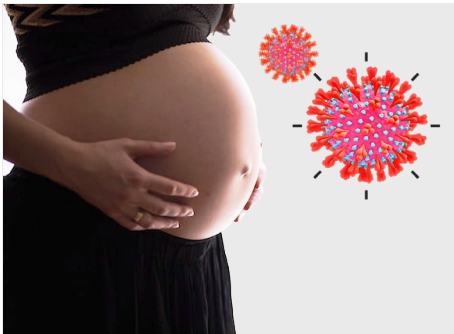
This could be a

- Friend

Should you get the COVID-19 vaccine if you are pregnant or breastfeeding?



If you get COVID-19 when you are pregnant you could get very sick from it.



The baby in your belly could also get sick from COVID-19.



The COVID-19 vaccine can stop you and your baby from getting very sick from COVID-19.



Ask your doctor when is a good time to get a COVID-19 vaccine when you are pregnant.

Is it safe?

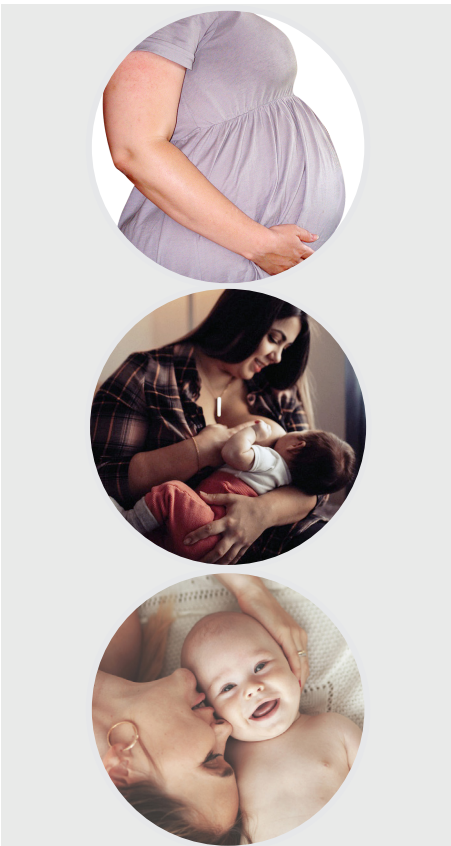


There is a group of people who know a lot about health and the COVID-19 vaccine.

They are called the **Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation**.

We say **ATAGI** for short.



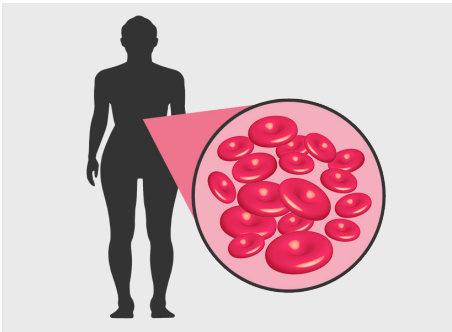
ATAGI says it is safe for people to get the COVID-19 vaccine if they are

- Pregnant
- Breastfeeding
- Trying to have a baby.

How does the COVID-19 vaccine help you?



COVID-19 vaccines help your body make **antibodies**.



Antibodies are small things in your blood.

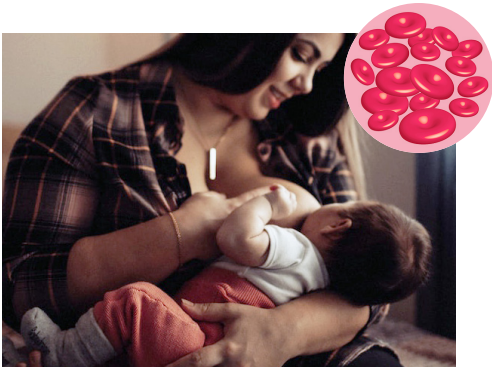
They help your body deal with getting sick from things like colds or the flu.



Antibodies do not hurt your baby.



After you get the COVID-19 vaccine your baby in your belly might get some of the antibodies.



When you are breastfeeding your baby might get some antibodies from your milk.



Antibodies can help your baby's body learn how to deal with COVID-19.

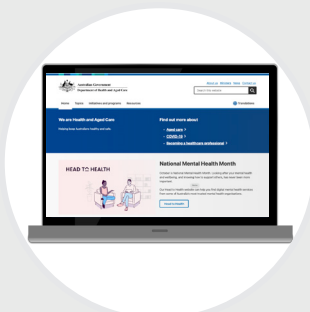
