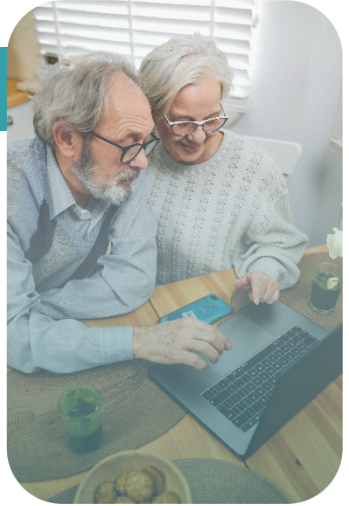

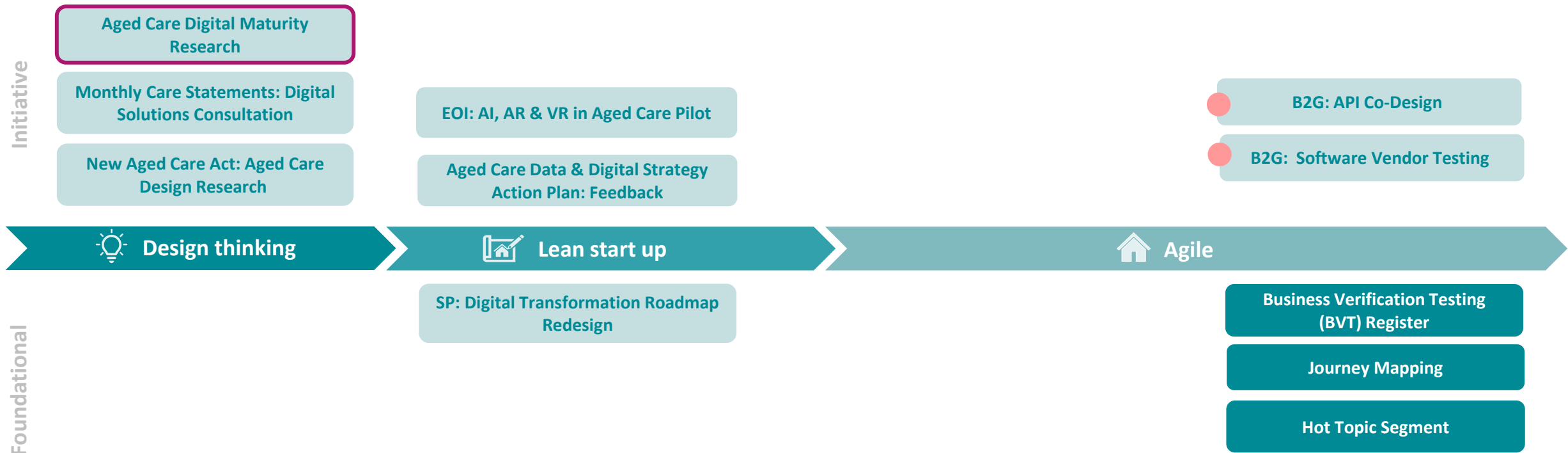

The Albanese Government will deliver historic aged care reforms to ensure the viability and quality of aged care, and support growing numbers of older Australians choosing to retain their independence and remain in their homes as they age.

Around 1.4 million Australians will benefit from a new Support at Home program by 2035 independent, in their home and their community for longer.

\$5.6 billion will be invested in a reform package which represents the greatest investment in aged care in Australia's history. The package includes these major changes:

- A \$4.3 billion investment in Support at Home, to come into effect on 1 July 2025
- Essential changes to improve the funding, viability, and quality of residential aged care
 - A no worse off principle will provide certainty to people already in aged care about their future care.
 - The treatment of the family home won't change.

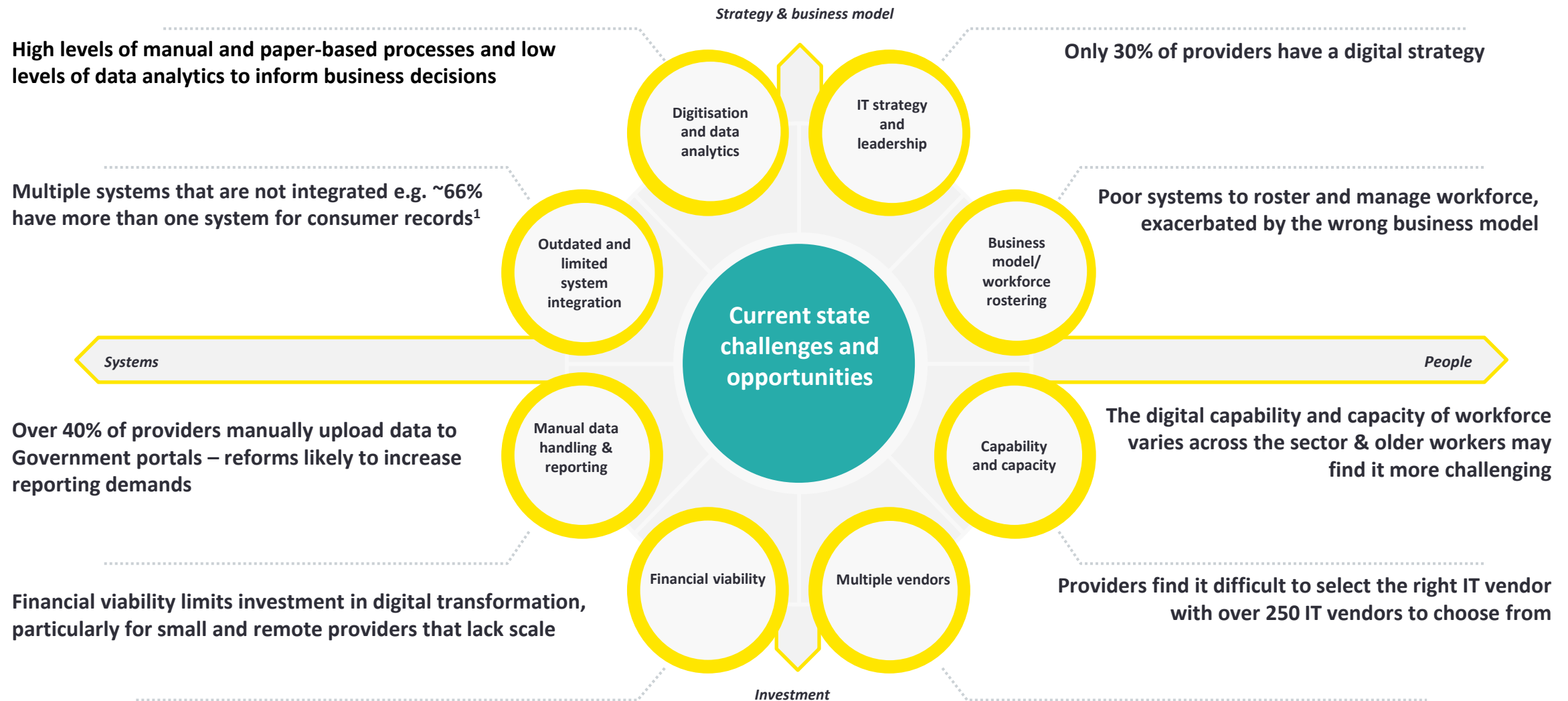

Digital maturity varies substantially across the aged care sector with several known challenges



Question....

1

What are the key challenges your business experiences in improving your digital maturity?



EY has been engaged to better understand the current digital maturity of the aged care sector and how it differs across different types of providers

Key questions

The project seeks to answer four key questions:

1. What is the current level of digital maturity for aged care providers?
2. What are the key barriers and challenges inhibiting aged care providers from improving their digital maturity?
3. What are the types of support and enablers providers need to help improve their digital maturity?
4. What are the core elements of digital maturity for aged care providers that lead to success?

Key considerations

The project will consider:

1. Diversity of aged care providers
2. Role of soft skills such as leadership, culture and management, capability and capacity
3. Role of emerging technologies such as artificial intelligence (AI) and machine learning (ML)
4. Impending reforms and how providers will need to respond
5. Current and future financial sustainability
6. New innovative models of care.

Improving the digital maturity of the sector may help to...

Consumers:

- Improve older persons' engagement, choice and control over when, what and how services are delivered
- Improve quality of care

Providers:

- Reduce administrative and reporting burden
- Improve workforce engagement & retention
- Improve efficiency & reduce ongoing costs
- Improve data quality and timeliness to inform business decisions

Government:

- Improve quality and timeliness of data to inform decision making
- Improve transparency & accountability
- Reduce administrative burden & cost

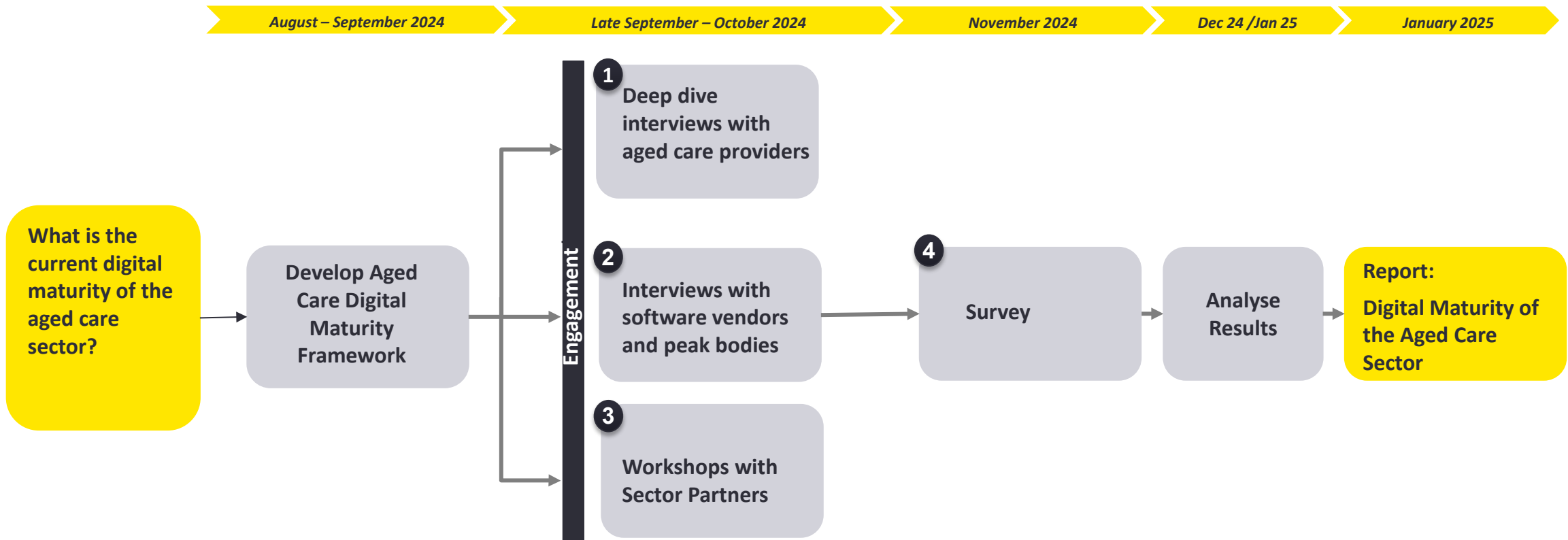

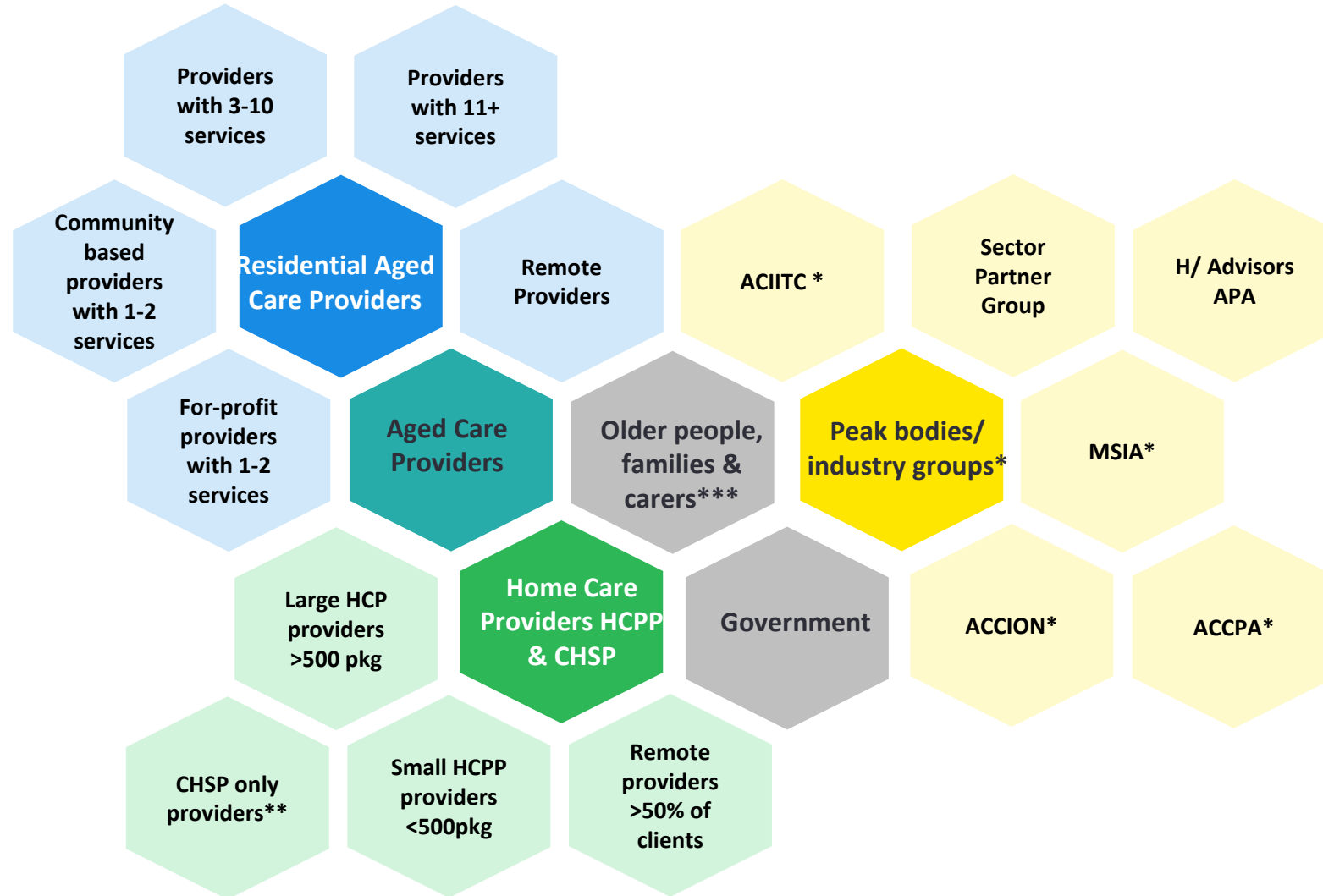
To answer the research questions, we will be engaging with the sector in four key ways



Additional stakeholder consultation (as required)

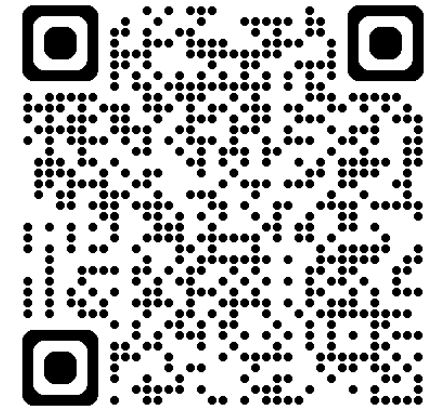
