

Why measurement matters

Incontinence is the loss of bladder and bowel control, which can impact independence, health and quality of life.

Incontinence associated dermatitis (IAD) is a type of skin irritation or damage, due to prolonged contact with urine or faeces. It is often characterised by redness, inflammation and/or skin breakdown. The quality of incontinence care can be measured by the prevalence of poor outcomes such as IAD.

Between 6 – 23% of care recipients in residential aged care experience IAD.

Residential aged care services can ensure people have access to the right treatments and support to assist bladder and bowel control and reduce risk factors for the development of IAD.

How to measure IAD

A single IAD assessment is completed for each care recipient with incontinence around the same time each quarter, as part of routine personal care. The IAD assessment tool used in the QI Program is the **Ghent Global IAD Categorisation Tool.**

Quality improvement

Awareness of risk factors and some simple steps can support incontinence management and reduce IAD.

Undertake ongoing screening for incontinence



Document findings in care record and undertake collaborative care planning



Implement appropriate multi-faceted strategies aligned with care recipient's needs and preferences
