



National Aged Care Mandatory Quality Indicator Program Quick Reference Guide: Incontinence care

This quick reference guide provides information for approved providers of residential aged care to understand and meet their obligations to collect and report data on incontinence care for the QI Program.

The incontinence care quality indicator is reported against:

Percentage of care recipients who experienced incontinence associated dermatitis

Incontinence describes accidental or involuntary loss of urine from the bladder or faeces from the bowel. Incontinence can impact independence, health and quality of life. For the purposes of the QI program, a care recipient experiences incontinence if during the quarter bladder incontinence occurs more than once a day or bowel incontinence more than once a week.

Incontinence associated dermatitis (IAD) type of skin irritation or damage, due to prolonged contact with urine or faeces. It is often characterised by redness, inflammation and/or skin breakdown. The quality of incontinence care can be measured by the prevalence of poor outcomes such as IAD.

For the purposes of the QI program, incontinence associated dermatitis is assessed using the Ghent Global IAD Categorisation Tool, included in the QI Program Manual 4.0 – Part A.

Four incontinence associated dermatitis categories

The Ghent Global IAD Categorisation Tool includes the following IAD categories: **Category 2: Skin loss Category 1: Persistent redness**

- 1A: Persistent redness without clinical signs of infection
- 2A: Skin loss without clinical signs of infection
- 2B: Skin loss with clinical signs of infection
- 1B: Persistent redness with clinical signs of infection

Collect incontinence care data

Monitor incontinence related care and skin integrity as part of the care recipient's routine personal care (e.g. bathing and toileting)

A single assessment for each care recipient, around the same time each quarter as part of routine care



- Record the number of care recipients:
- excluded because they were absent from the service for the entire quarter
- excluded from IAD assessment because they did not have incontinence
- who had incontinence



For each care recipient with incontinence, record if they experienced IAD, as well as recording against each of the four sub-categories

Approved providers of residential aged care must collect and report on incontinence care data quarterly, according to the requirements set out in the QI Program Manual 4.0 – Part A (Manual).

Report incontinence care data



Report the number of care recipients with incontinence:

- who experienced IAD
 - who experienced IAD, reported against each of the four sub-categories:
 - 1A: Persistent redness without clinical signs of infection
 - 1B: Persistent redness with clinical signs of infection
 - 2A: Skin loss without clinical signs of infection
 - 2B: Skin loss with clinical signs of infection

Additionally, report the number of care recipients:

- assessed for incontinence care
- who experienced incontinence
- excluded because they were absent from the service for the entire quarter
- excluded from IAD assessment because they did not have incontinence

EXAMPLE

Care recipient A

Care recipient B

- has bladder incontinence more than once per day
- more than once per day has no signs of IAD
- has persistent redness with no clinical signs of infection (Category 1A)

• has bladder incontinence

Care recipient C

- has bowel incontinence more than once per week
- has skin loss with no clinical signs of infection (Category 2A)
- 3 Number of care recipients assessed for incontinence care
- 3 Number of care recipients who experienced incontinence
- O Number of care recipients excluded because they were absent from the service for the entire quarter
- O Number of care recipients excluded from IAD assessment because they did not have incontinence
- (2) Number of care recipients with incontinence who experienced IAD

Number of care recipients who experienced IAD, reported against each of the four sub-categories:

- Category 1A: Persistent redness without clinical signs of infection
- O Category 1B: Persistent redness with clinical signs of infection
- Category 2A: Skin loss without clinical signs of infection
- O Category 2B: Skin loss with clinical signs of infection

Data recording templates for each quality indicator are available on the department's website. Use the templates to automatically calculate and summarise data for submission through the Government Provider Management System.

Submit QI Program data

There are three ways QI Program data can be submitted:



1. Through the GPMS



3. Through a third-party benchmarking company



Data must be submitted by the 21st day of the month after the end of each quarter
