## ABOUT THE NLCSP

The National Lung Cancer Screening Program (NLCSP) aims to reduce deaths from lung cancer and achieve better health outcomes for Australians through early detection of lung cancer.

The program targets asymptomatic (no signs or symptoms suggestive of lung cancer) high-risk individuals (based on tobacco cigarette smoking history) to detect lung cancer in its early stages to increase the likelihood of successful treatment and improved patient outcomes. By detecting lung cancer early, the program is expected to save hundreds of lives each year from lung cancer.

People are eligible for the program if they are:

- aged between 50-70 years, and
- show no signs or symptoms suggesting they may have lung cancer (that is, they are asymptomatic), and
- currently smoke or have quit smoking in the past 10 years, and
- have a history of tobacco cigarette smoking of at least 30 pack-years.

The screening will involve completing a low-dose computed tomography (CT) scan every two years.
