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Introduction

As the cornerstone of Australia's health care system, primary health care professionals play a vital role in keeping our communities healthy.

They are the trusted team of health professionals that people often turn to first – including general practitioners, nurses, midwives and allied health workers – improving health outcomes and reducing pressure on hospital emergency departments.

However, Australia is facing a critical shortage of primary health care workers, including a projected shortfall of 7,700 GPs by 2033¹ and an estimated shortfall of more than 26,000 primary health care nurses by 2035.² Contributing factors include a lack of understanding of what primary health care is, and misconceptions about the career opportunities available.

The *Join The Team* campaign aims to challenge this narrative by showcasing the diverse, dynamic, and rewarding nature of primary health care careers.

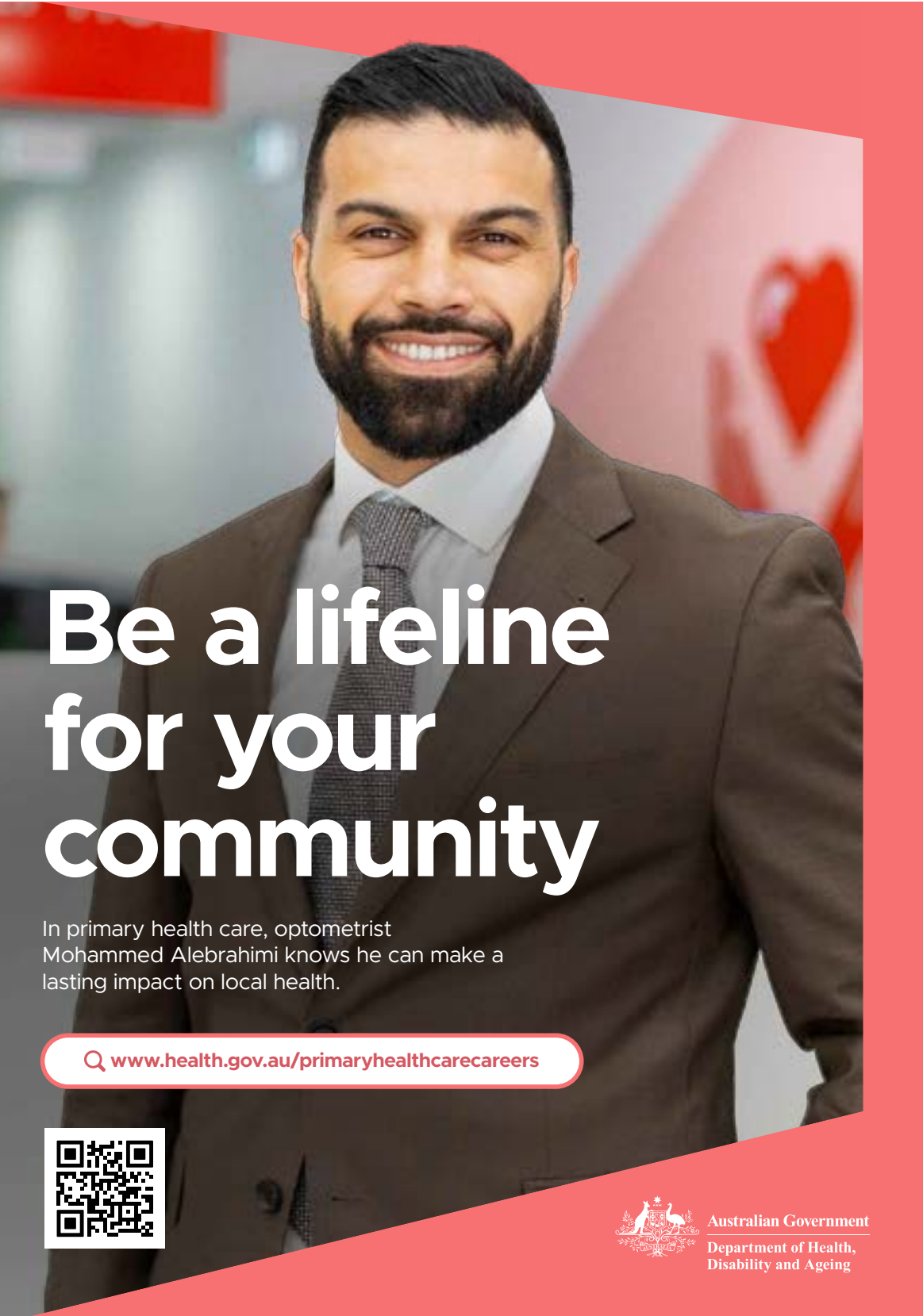

Optometrist

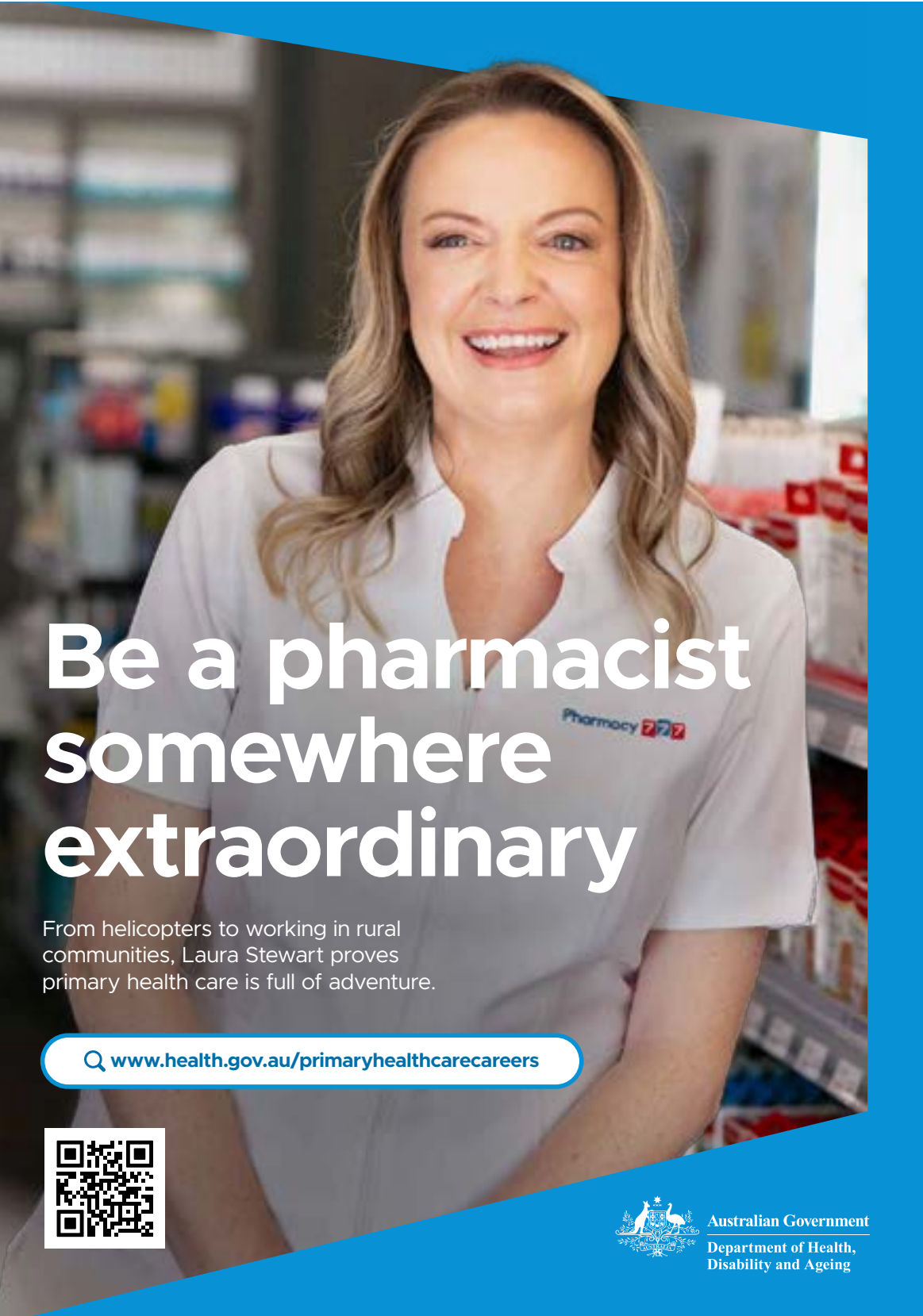
Optometrist Dr Mohammed Alebrahimi is proving primary health care is about people, not just patients.

Pharmacist

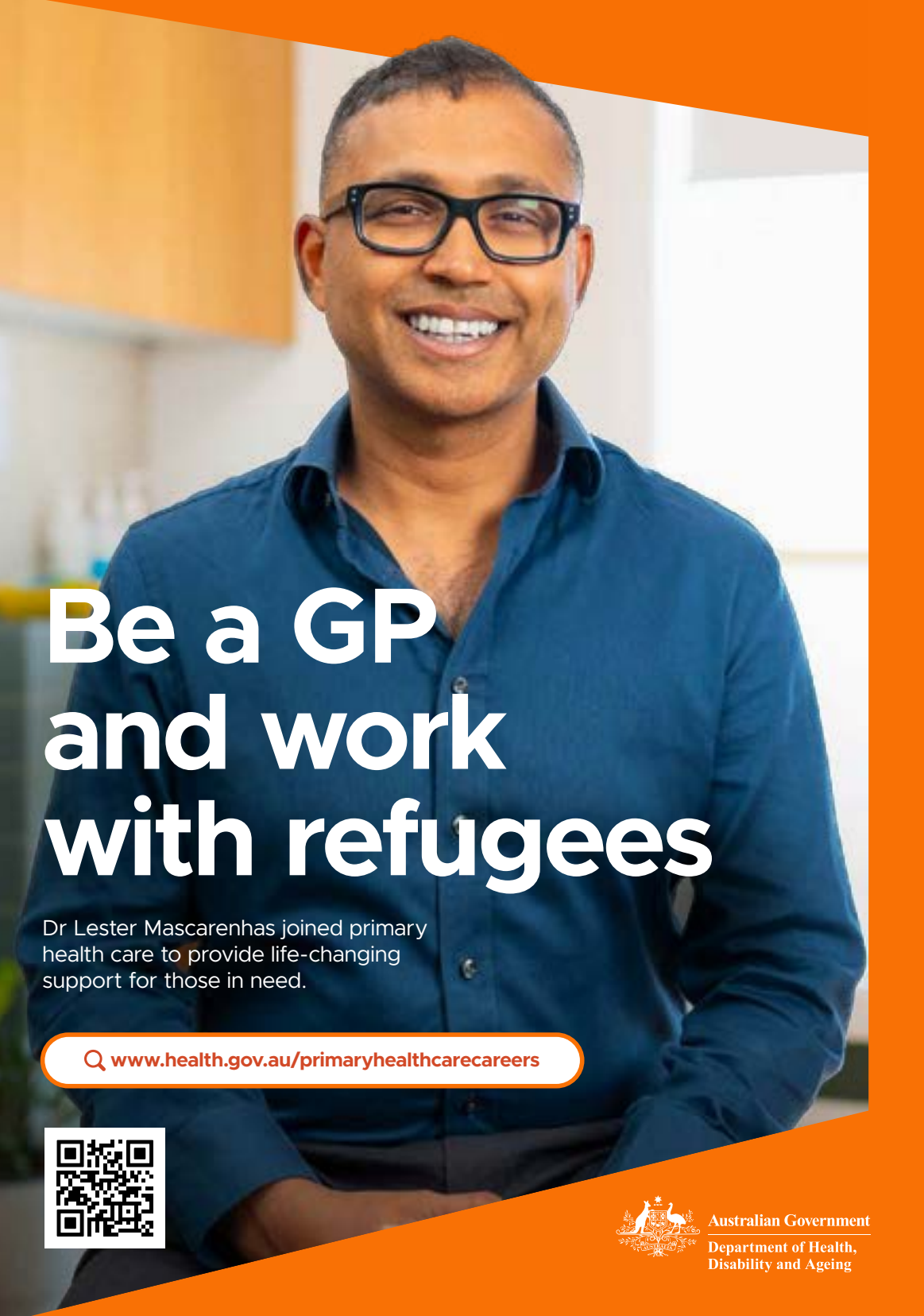
Looking for a career that takes you places? Pharmacist Laura Stewart found hers in primary health care.

Nurse Practitioner

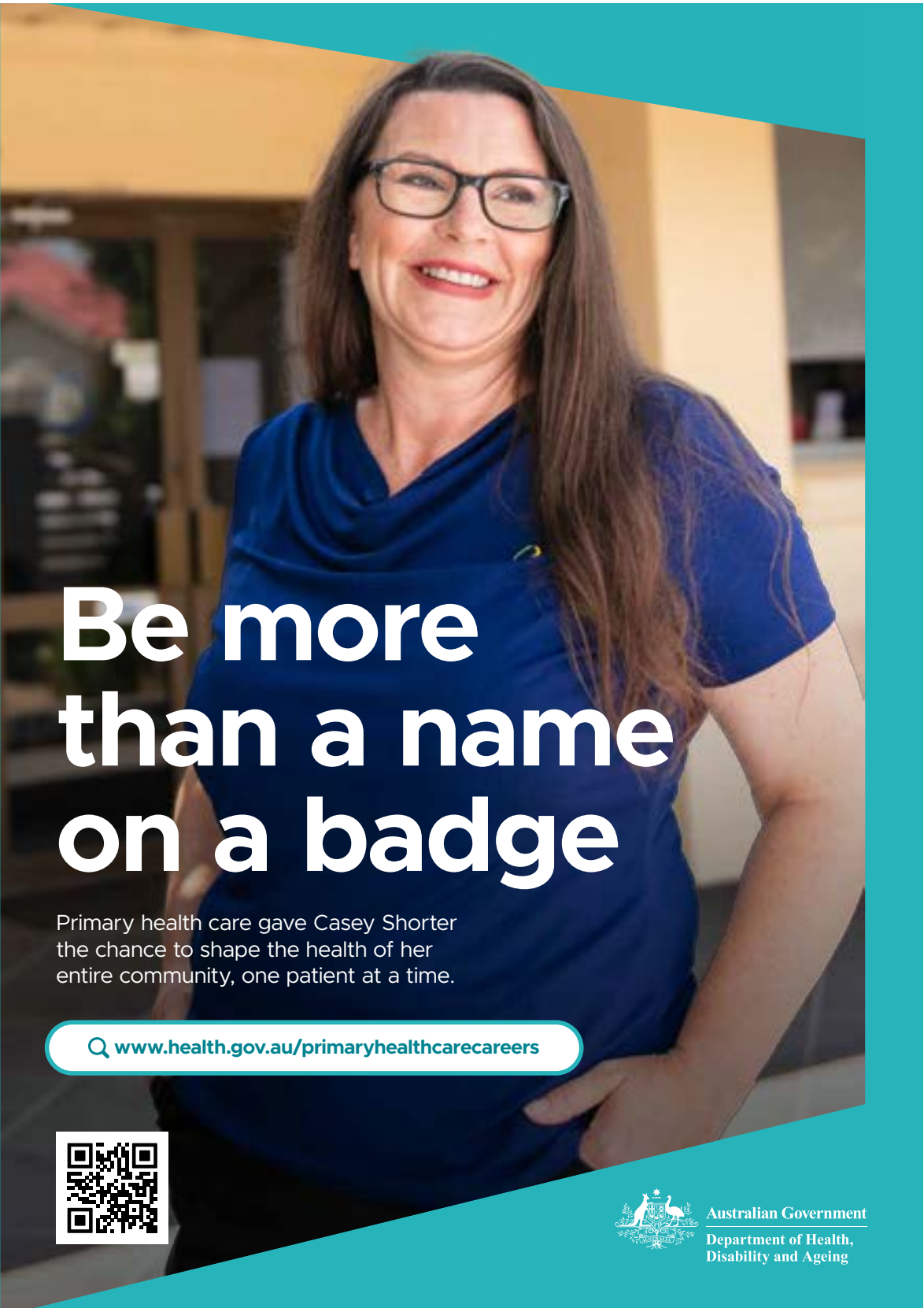
For Dr Chloe Jansz, there’s never a boring day in primary health care.

Physiotherapist

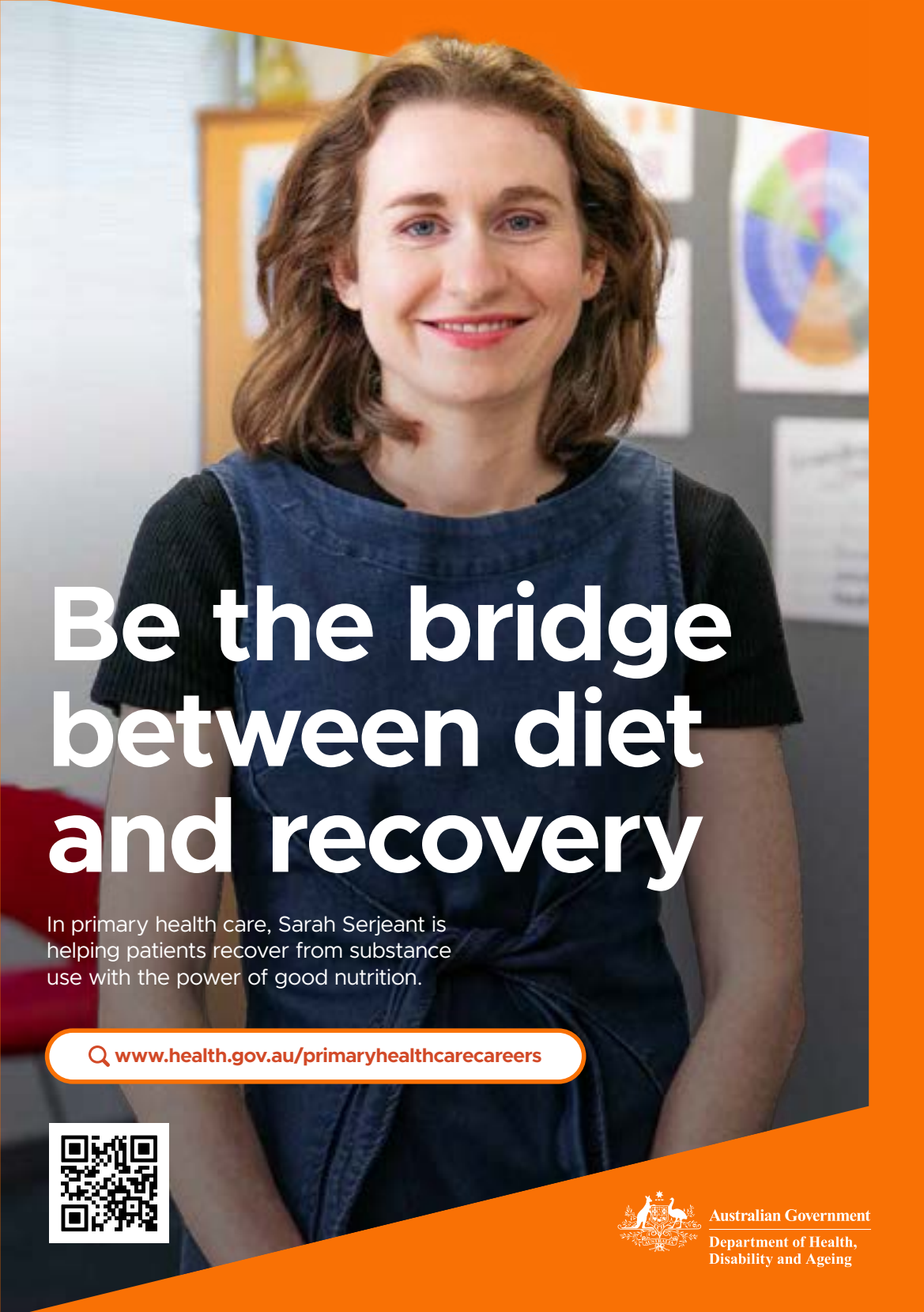
After graduating physiotherapy and co-founding a group of clinics, Ken Nguyen found primary health care offered both impact and opportunity.

Dietitian

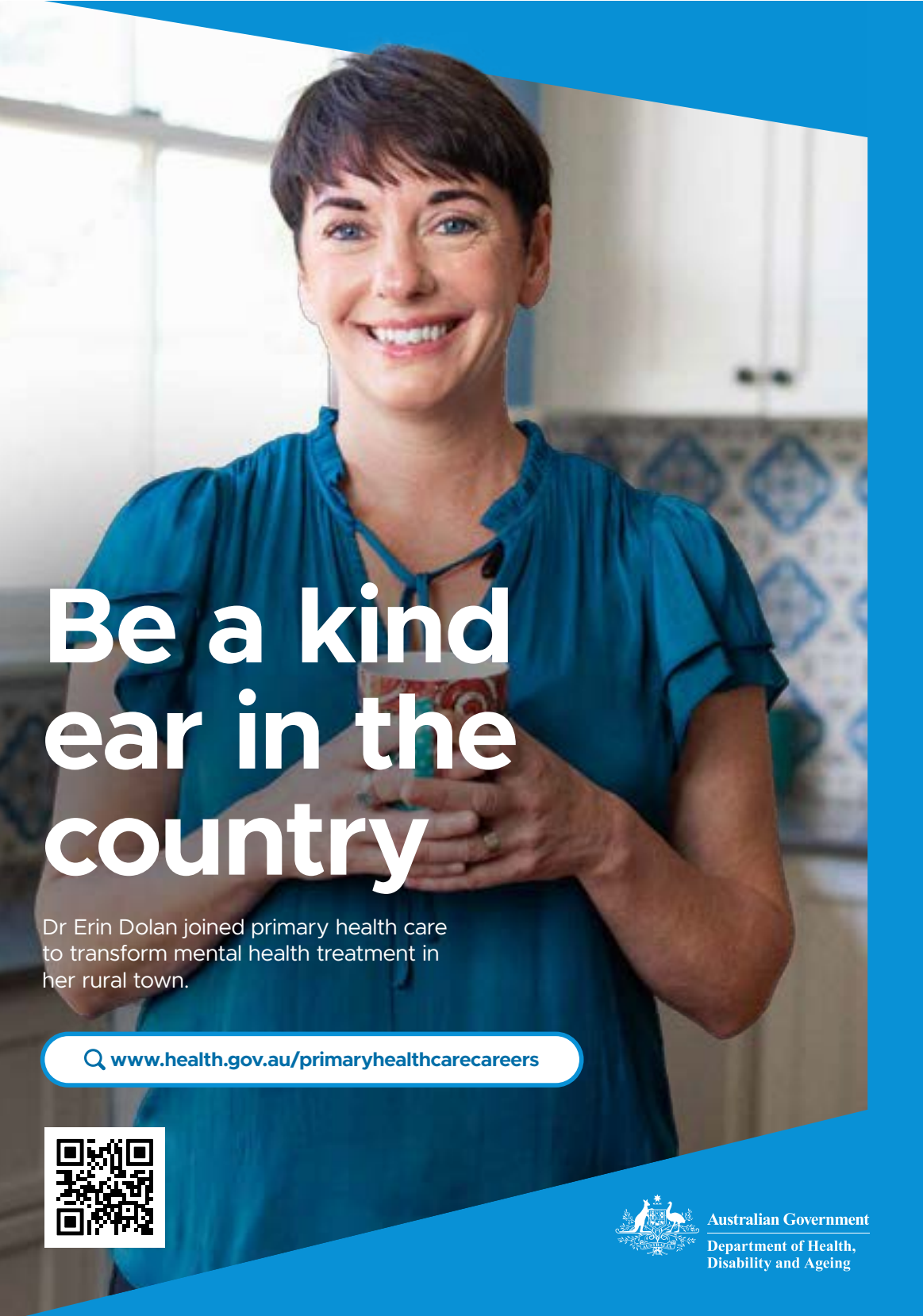
Sarah Serjeant uses her expertise as a dietitian to heal people from the inside out.

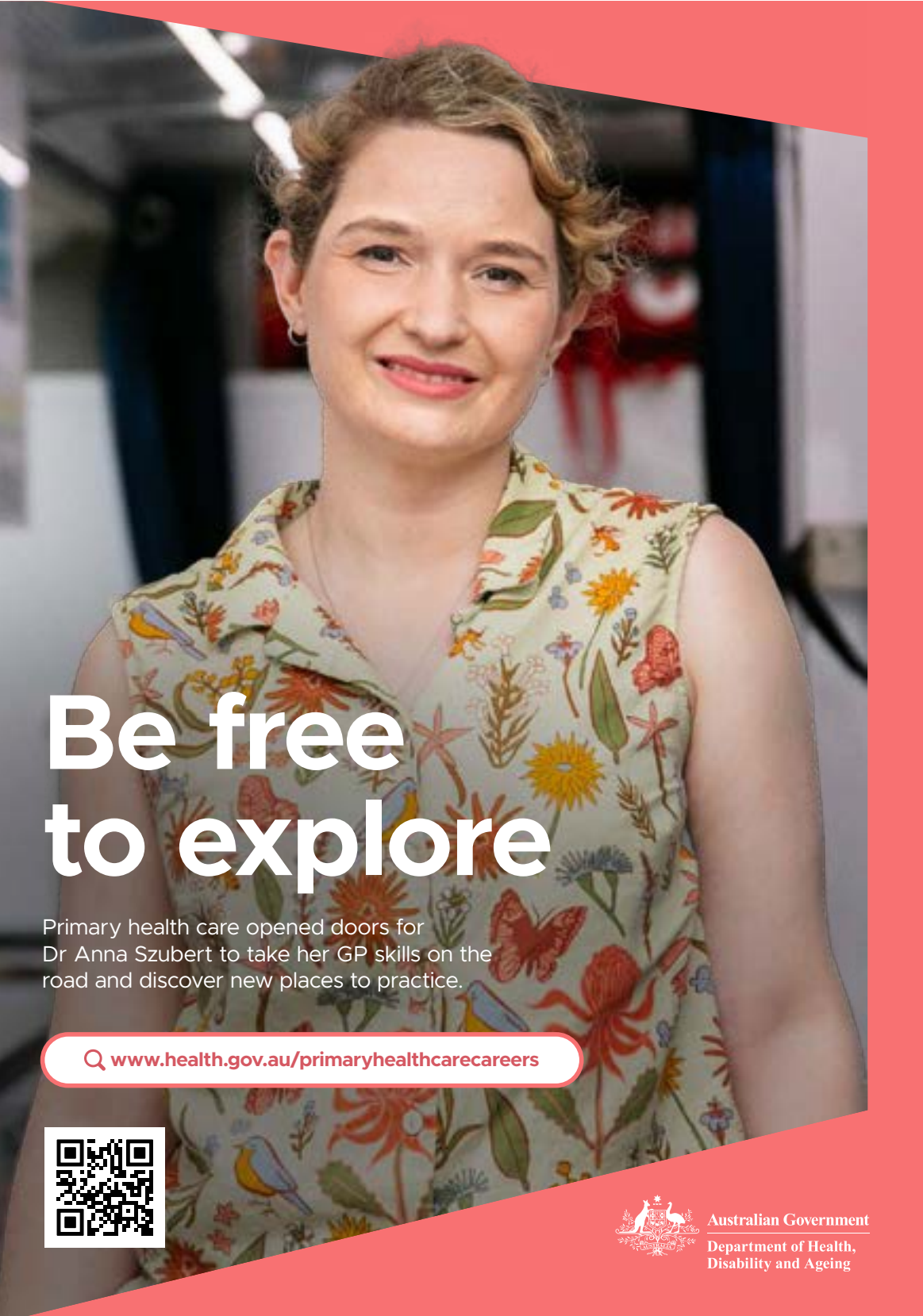
In Dr Erin Dolan’s psychology practice, every conversation matters.

Primary health care is the first point of contact for health care outside of hospitals or specialist medical doctors. Professionals in this field diagnose and treat health conditions and offer long-term care to their patients.

Common careers include general practitioners (GPs), nurses, midwives and allied health professionals such as psychologists and physiotherapists.

Primary health care offers diverse opportunities for both local and overseas-qualified health care professionals. Its holistic nature allows you to make a meaningful and lasting impact on peoples' lives and the broader community.

Who are primary health care workers?

Primary health care workers are trusted professionals who provide essential health care and advice. They have a vital role in supporting the community's health and wellbeing, helping to reduce pressure on our hospitals.

There are plenty of career opportunities in diverse fields such as allied health, general practice (GP), nursing, and so many more. You'll have the freedom to provide treatment and deliver services and education tailored to each individual. And, in primary health care, no two days are the same.
