

Yellow Fever Vaccination Centres

This fact sheet provides a summary of the key responsibilities of an approved Yellow Fever Vaccination Centre (YFVC).

More detailed requirements and procedures are outlined in the <u>National Guidelines for</u> Yellow Fever Vaccination Centres and Providers (guidelines).

Meeting and maintaining the assessed YFVC criteria

To become an approved YFVC, primary care practices must meet the Criteria for Assessing Vaccination Centres (please see <u>guidelines</u>), as well as any additional requirements set by their state or territory health authority.

To keep their approval YFVC must maintain these criteria, including having:

- at least one practitioner accredited to prescribe the yellow fever vaccine,
- appropriate <u>cold chain management</u> strategies,
- · reliable recordkeeping, and
- capacity to recognise and respond to adverse events, including anaphylaxis.

Communication with state and territory health authorities

YFVC must update their <u>state/territory health authority</u> of significant changes to the practice within **7 days**. Significant changes include (but are not limited to), new practitioners, updated contact details or changes of address.

YFVC must nominate a 'responsible person' as a point of contact for administrative requirements. This person is responsible for reporting significant changes to the practice, using a form provided by the state or territory health authority.

Ordering vaccines and vaccination certificates

YFVC are responsible for ordering the approved yellow fever vaccine, Stamaril, through Sanofi-Aventis Australia Pty Ltd. Please note it is the YFVC, **not** the practitioner, which is approved to order yellow fever vaccines.

YFVC are also responsible for ordering booklets of blank *International Certificate of Vaccination or Prophylaxis* using the WHO order form.

Recording vaccinations and reporting adverse events

YFVC must retain records of all yellow fever vaccinations administered in their practice, including any information required to issue a replacement certificate. Vaccinations should also be registered in the <u>Australian Immunisation Register</u>.

Adverse events following immunisation must be reported to the <u>state or territory health</u> authority, or to the <u>Therapeutic Goods Administration</u>.
