





- · updated formatting.



Initiative: Aged Care Data & Reporting Review

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Aged Care Data & Reporting Review

Project objectives:

- Provide a consolidated view of the full scope of information collected from aged care providers (including reporting mechanisms).
- Identify inconsistencies or duplication of data collection and provision, and interactions between reporting requirements.
- Design a data ecosystem that makes high quality data available to support stakeholders across the system.
- Reduce unnecessary administrative burden on providers and government through more intelligent data sharing and reporting.
- Develop a roadmap for data standardisation and streamlined reporting, linked to system design and implementation of known and future reforms, that will see improvements in the scope, quality, consistency and utility of aged care data.

- The <u>National Aged Care Data Asset</u> (NACDA) is available for researchers to access via AIHW's National Health Data Hub
- NACDA is a linked data resource, bringing together data already collected in aged care, health and other community service settings
- NACDA contains de-identified person/service/provider data only
- We are aiming to expand service-level aged care data in NACDA
- Access to NACDA requires a proficient data analyst → program of analytical outputs to support wider community access to NACDA
- What would be most useful to you in developing NACDA in future?






- The <u>National Aged Care Data Asset</u> brings together person-level data which are usually siloed across different administrative systems
 - ➤ Links up aged care data sources with health and other community services data
 - Unique person-number used to follow people's paths through the datasets
- Allows approved researchers access to granular data to answer important aged care research/policy questions that need linked up data
- It's an enduring asset, meaning data will be updated regularly and new datasets added over time
- AIHW's approach to developing NACDA is informed by consultation with non-government, peak body and government stakeholders







Why is NACDA?

- The Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety recommended that AIHW curate and make publicly available the NACDA, to ensure comprehensive data about the sector is available for research
- NACDA is an action under the Department of Health, Disability and Ageing's <u>Aged Care Data and Digital Strategy 2024 –2029</u>







Why is NACDA?

 NACDA's purpose is to better understand the pathways, experiences and outcomes of people receiving aged care, as well as the operation and performance of the aged care system


Where is NACDA?

- The first iteration of NACDA is available for researchers to access via AIHW's <u>National Health Data Hub</u> (NHDH)
- NHDH is a national data linkage system for health research and analysis
- Accessible to approved government and non-government researchers via remote secure access data analysis environments
- NHDH was formerly known as NIHSI (National Integrated Health Services Information)
- Entire data modules are made accessible for approved projects
- 'By exception' tables for sensitive data (e.g. exact dates) available with justification
- 'Hub + n' option for linking on bespoke datasets (e.g. surveys)





Data modules available in NACDA via NHDH at July 2025




- Aged care module has 60 tables across a range of national programs (see data item list)
- Encrypted aged care service/ provider ID and basic information (e.g. organisation type, remoteness)





Scope of aged care data available in NACDA via NHDH at July 2025





What is NACD<u>C</u>?

NACDC is an independent & central repository of (unlinked) national aged care data

What is NACD<u>C</u>?

GEN Aged Care Data is a one-stop-shop (website) for data and information on aged care in Australia

- established in 2017
- topic pages updated annually
- other resources available: access data, publications, dashboards, factsheets
- includes AIHW releases and Department of Health, Disability and Ageing releases
- request customised aged care data (from NACDC):
 gen-agedcaredata.gov.au/request-customised-data








How to access NACDA?

- Access and governance for NACDA currently follows NHDH arrangements
- The Department is custodian for aged care data in NACDA via NHDH
- Projects need to align with eligibility requirements (e.g. team has proficient analyst) and approved uses of NHDH (e.g. not for commercial gain)







How to access NACDA?

 NACDA is a distinct entity – own front door (webpage), researcher resources, and can have own governance in future (as necessary)



The National Aged Care Data Asset (NACDA) aims to bring together de-identified person-level data collected across aged care, health and community service settings for aged care research purposes.

The NACDA is an enduring asset, meaning data will be updated regularly and new datasets added over time.







What next for NACDA?


- Next annual update of aged care data in NHDH is planned for Aug 2025
 - Will include aged care data to 30 June 2024
- Future development of NACDA will focus on expanding data sources as outlined by Royal Commission, in consultation with stakeholders
 - De-identified service-level data on quality, financial, workforce
 - > Sensitive data may be quarantined for certain projects and purposes
- Evaluation monitoring that NHDH is delivering smooth access and use and timely outputs for NACDA projects
- Service offering resources to support NACDA users
- Program of analytical outputs to support wider community access e.g. update of 'Interface between aged care and health systems' on GEN
