Budget 2019-20

Guaranteeing Medicare and Access to Medicines

Guaranteeing Medicare - \$6b additional investment

- ▶ Improved patient access to diagnostic imaging investment of \$151.9m to bring total new MRI bulk billing licences to over 50; new MBS services for breast MRI (\$32.6m); increased Medicare rebate for diagnostic radiology and ultrasounds (\$198.6m); Fluorodeoxglucose PET for evaluation of breast cancer; and MBS Review update to diagnostic imaging

Improving access to medicines - \$40b over four years

- ► Life Saving Drugs Program (incl Brineura® for Batten disease)
- Supporting pharmacies and consumer access AHI fee (\$230m); medication management programs (\$15m); and faster payments for community pharmacies (\$213m in 2018–19)
- ► Stoma Appliance Scheme new listings
- Expansion of the Continuous Glucose Monitoring Program (\$0.2m)

Ageing and Aged Care

More Choices for a Longer Life - \$7b additional investment

- ▶ \$320m increase to general subsidy for residential care
- ► More home care packages (\$282.4m) up from 60,308 in 2012–13, 124,032 in 2018–19, to 157,154 in 2022–23
- ► Extending the Commonwealth Home Support Programme (\$5.9b)
- Serious Incident Response Scheme (\$1.5m)

2019-20 Budget

Long Term National Health Plan \$104b in 2019–20 for health, aged care and sport
