Latest Epidemiology and WHO information

Dr Rebecca Newton provided Members with the most current information on both confirmed cases and deaths from 2019-nCoV on both mainland China and other countries.

Total: 844 confirmed cases globally (24.01.2020 12:00AM)

- 830 on mainland China (29 Provinces affected)
- 14 other countries
- 25 Deaths
- 34 patients recovered

Cases have been reported in Thailand, Japan, Hong Kong Special Administrative Region, Taipei Municipality, China, Macau Special Administrative Region, United States of America and the Republic of Korea.

Transmission

- CFR 4%
- Severity 25%
- R0 = 1.4 2.5
- 4th generation cases in Wuhan
- 2nd generation cases outside Wuhan.

Members noted that there is more than likely a greater number of cases than actually reflected in the confirmed cases and that a caveat should be placed around the CFR. The CFR would likely be lower if the actual number of cases was known.

Members also noted that when referring to severity and CFR they should talk about cases and deaths as well as significant number of cases reported rather than a CFR.

The CMO advised members that the World Health Organization (WHO) has assessed the risk of this event to be very high in China, high at the regional level and moderate at the global level. At this stage a Public Health Event of International Concern (PHEIC) has not been declared.

The WHO will also send another mission to Wuhan, Hebei Province, to see if they can discover the source of the virus.

CDNA update

Dr Sonya Bennett provided an update on the work undertaken by CDNA on the development of the interim Novel Coronavirus 2019 (2019-nCoV) Series of National Guidelines for Public Health Units (SoNG). The document summarises interim recommendation for surveillance, infection control, laboratory testing and contact management for 2019-nCoV.

Members noted that the document is classified as interim because the situation is changing so rapidly that the document will be reviewed and updated regularly. Members also noted that

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infection control section requires further work. CDNA will be discussing this at the 2.30pm meeting.

Members reviewed the issue of the exclusion of children who are contacts of confirmed cases from school and noted that the exclusion would apply to primary and secondary school teachers also. The rational being that this would prevent the spread of the disease to school children who are unable to self-monitor. Adult students attending University or Technical Colleges would be expected to self-monitor as adults.

Action: CDNA to share a rationale for the "exclusion of children rather than adults" to AHPPC.

Dr Mike Catton provided members with an update on laboratory capacity noting that the PHLN guidance on laboratory testing for 2019-nCoV can be found on the Department of Health website.

Action: Health to speak to cruise line companies regarding messaging.

Members noted that the NIR will be producing SitReps and WoG talking points over the weekend and these will be disseminated to the relevant committees and that meetings would be called as required.

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
