 - o Dr David Pencheon's work on reducing the climate change footprint in the United Kingdom from health services has been useful.
- Climate change and health outcomes were mentioned with reference to the 2019 international report of The Lancet Countdown on health and climate change: ensuring that the health of a child born today is not defined by a changing dimate and the Australian 2019 report of the MJA-Lancet Countdown on health and climate change: a turbulent year with mixed progress.
 - There are nuanced impacts, including on chronic diseases, from water and rain events and some modelling of these nuances may be required.
