## Current hubs offering vaccination services

There are many vaccination hubs offering services for people with disability, their carers and disability workers.

Hubs help people with disability, their family and carers, and the disability workforce get vaccinated in the fastest way possible specific to their circumstances.

## Ways to get proof of vaccination

There are three ways to get [proof of your COVID-19 vaccination](#):

1. Online: to find out how, visit the Services Australia website [How to get proof](#).
2. Ask your vaccine provider to print your immunisation history statement for you.
3. Call the Australian Immunisation Register and ask them to send your immunisation history statement or COVID-19 digital certificate to you. It can take up to 14 days for your statement or certificate to arrive in the post. Contact the Australian Immunisation Register on **1800 653 809** Monday to Friday 8 am to 5 pm.
