HEALTH PROVIDER COMPLIANCE & PROCEEDS OF CRIME

KEY POINTS

- The Department of Health does not have the power to restrain and sell off assets under any Health legislation.
- The process to apply powers to restrain and sell off assets is referred to as the Proceeds of Crimes Act (POCA), which is administered by the Australian Federal Police (AFP).
- Where the Department identifies a fraud matter with significant associated costs the matter is raised with the AFP who has a dedicated team to assist government agencies.
- The AFP will consider the matter and determine if POCA should and could be utilised in a specific matter.
- The AFP would be best placed to provide information on the POCA process.
- The Department is working with AFP to help identify matters where POCA could be appropriately utilised.
- To date, the Department has no debts to the Commonwealth where POCA has resulted in the restraining and selling of an individual's assets.

FACTS & FIGURES

- The Department raised \$29 million in debts against providers and recovered more than \$13 million in 2016-17 – Department of Health 2017, Annual Report 2016-17.
- In 2016-17 there were 29 successful prosecutions as the result of the Department of Health's compliance program
- The Department raised \$49 million in debts against providers and recovered more than \$22 million in 2017-18. The Department identified \$148 million in savings from behavioural change resulting from compliance activities conducted in prior years. – Department of Health, Annual Report 2017-18.
- In 2017-18 there were 20 successful prosecutions as the result of the Department of Health's compliance program.

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ACTUAL IMPACT

• The Department is currently working with the AFP with respect to an investigation where POCA may be employed for the first time.

BACKGROUND
